





District Round-up – News from around the Region

London District 1 – Matt Bentley

It's hard to believe it's been almost 4 months already since I took over as NODA representative for District 1. I've seen some excellent productions and am extremely grateful for the warmth with which societies have welcomed me in my new role (although I'm still the same friendly face in the audience for the most part).

One of the areas I was very interested in when I took up the role was diversity and inclusion. It's now been over two years since the Black Lives Matter movement, which became the focal point for a lot of these excellent and essential conversations in the community theatre world, so it felt appropriate to look at the progress that has been made. Two productions in particular stood out to me in this regard, each taking a different approach and finding success.

Festoon Theatre Company was set up during the pandemic and has been leading the way in diverse casting, with a casting policy requiring a minimum of 50% people of colour. Festoon are exceeding their policy aims and it was a delight to see such a wealth of talent in their excellent production of Bonnie and Clyde.

Centre Stage's approach of colour-blind casting in their production of Rogers and Hammerstein's Cinderella was equally effective. To see three talented South Asian women in lead roles in an amateur musical in central London (when this is not a requirement of the script) was both exciting and well overdue, particularly when added to the diversity present in the remainder of the cast.

Other highlights in this regard included New Stagers' production of I Have Five Daughters and Sedos's Carrie, both of which were chosen to showcase some excellent female talent. Sedos's new, queer interpretation of A Midsummer Night's Dream delivered a top-notch cast from across the gender spectrum with excellent results. I was also impressed by Quay Players' approach of reinterpreting the role of Donkey in their production of Shrek as a successful alternative to having a white actor try to replicate Eddie Murphy's performance in the film.

While there is still a lot of work to do in this area, I'm proud of the progress that has been made so far. We knew it was going to be hard work, but these are all positive steps in the right direction.

On that note, I am thrilled that Tess Robinson, a strong diversity advocate in District 1, is offering free online workshops for any society that wants to identify what actions they can take to make progress in this area. London District 2 – Mike Smith

I am delighted to report that Societies in District 2 of our London Region are alive and kicking! After the long and difficult time that we have all been through it is such a joy to be able to be back enjoying what our groups do so well – perform and entertain!

I have noticed a real newfound enthusiasm from those performing (and all those supportive back-room boys and girls!) and audiences too, are very happy to be back and so appreciative of being entertained.

A real wealth of talent is back on stage, showcasing plays, musicals and of course the ever-popular pantomimes. Such a mix of entertaining performances I have had the pleasure of attending over the past few months.

Hillingdon Musical Society's production of "Musicals Behaving Badly" - written in house – had the audiences dancing in the aisles. Winning them the London Region Flame Award. This was followed by an equally enjoyable performance of "Young Frankenstein".

A challenging production of "Big Fish" was brilliantly accomplished by GLOC Musical Theatre group. The costumes and set for this were stunning, as was the choreography and Direction.

Beaufort Players entertained in their usual highly professional manner with a Tom Wells play entitled "The Kitchen Sink". A delightful, yet tender and emotional portrayal of family with big dreams and small changes – and a home with a dis-functional sink!!

As we approach the end of 2022, I'm still looking forward to seeing shows like "The Mikado" from Julian Operatic Society and also several pantomimes.

I must say it is interesting to see how many Societies are now embracing the use of more technology in their productions. Lighting, sound and projection – all a great asset to so many shows.

Good Luck to everyone with your forthcoming programmes, let's hope 2023 will be a kinder year to us all.

London District 3 – Des Wilby

District 3 has certainly made a full recovery in 2022 with the vast majority of groups having already staged several productions. Whilst the majority of these have been musicals (Shrek and Our House continue to be very popular choices), there have also been some excellent plays and G&S shows. With Christmas rapidly approaching it is looking like a busy Panto season in District 3!

Following on from Covid, and for many societies an enforced period of inactivity, societies have been looking to improve their financial situation with a variety of fundraising events. Inflation and the inevitable increased costs in staging a production have made this even more of a priority. I am fortunate to have so many quality societies in District 3 and feel confident everyone will weather the current uncertainty and continue to delight their audiences.

London District 4 – Robin Kelly.

As will no doubt be commented on elsewhere, it really is good to be back in the swing of things after the worst of Covid. Putting matters into perspective, between April and today, 23 District 4 show reports have been completed. Only 13 reports were completed in the whole of last year. It has to be said however that Covid still impacts, with individuals still unable to attend rehearsals due to self-isolation. Notable highlights so far this year have included the reformation of Dartford Operatic & Dramatic Society's Youth Theatre Group and we look forward to their next production in December.

Reduced ticket sales as a result of the cost of living have emerged as a major concern for all groups. Filling the Orchard Theatre for DAODS or the Churchill Theatre for WWOS is becoming increasingly difficult – even for shows such as Made in Dagenham. Confidence isn't improved by increasingly late bookings. Although the recent Bromley Players production of Evita hit 90%, only 60% had been sold one week before the show. Given the eye watering costs of mounting musicals, this is obviously an increasingly serious concern. Drama is also not immune to the problem. While Erith Playhouse and Bob Hope Theatre are in the fortunate position of having their own premises, covering the increasing costs of heating and lighting is a headache no matter the quality of production (and there have been some outstanding productions in both theatres this year). It becomes increasingly important that we support each other's productions. It also helps to be aware just what standards are being achieved elsewhere in NODA world!

One last thing. As many in District 4 are no doubt aware, I am currently undergoing treatment for Prostate Cancer. I make no secret of this and indeed am on a mission to persuade all males over 45 to get themselves PSA tested. I am one of the lucky ones. It was only as a result of responding to an advert for testing at a local chemist that I discovered there was an issue. Treatment appears to be going well but radiotherapy will not kick in until January. In the meantime, I continue with my reporting duties — although it might be that reports are not quite as prompt as I would like. However, if at any point this proves to be impossible, Jackie Mitchell is ready to step into the breach.

London District 5 – Phil Wilcox

Over the past few months I have reviewed no fewer than four contrasting and well-acted productions put on in quick succession by a single society (CODA).

These were the thrice postponed, COVID-affected Little Women (for which one female actor won best performance), swiftly followed by Steel Magnolias; an al fresco version of Pride and Prejudice: and, most recently, a terrific four-hander, The 39 Steps.

Elsewhere, Mayhem Theatre Company have also been prolific, staging a brace of outdoor shows, the delightful musical revue Songs Under The Summer Sun and their usual high standard annual Shakespeare, this time The Merry Wives of Windsor. They also recently mounted a well-cast version of 9 To 5.

Another company, Woodmansterne Operatic and Dramatic Society, put on two totally differing, and highly enjoyable, shows - Sister Act and Not Yet!, an entertaining self-written musical theatrical spoof. They also featured in an article in Noda Today, which I prepared in conjunction with them.

Now I am currently anticipating for the usual round of pantos in January, to follow Parish Players' delayed, fun-filled Camelot The Panto earlier in the year.

London District 6 - Paul Daynes

As Autumn rolls into Panto Season and we gear up for Dames, Dancers and Delights we can report a busy few months in District 6.

In October, WP Drama produced Stevie a compelling play about the life and works of Stevie Smith, the English Poet. It was an absorbing three-hander superbly led by Sarah Jones in the titular role that brought the words and stories of Stevie Smith to the Redbridge audience; and all on National Poetry Day.

Havering Music Makers wrote their own script to link popular songs together that reflected the life of East End pub landlady Liz, before last orders were called on her life. Last Orders at the Castle Inn was a great vehicle for the twenty-one performers to perform thirty-two numbers that the audience knew and could join in with. A fun evening with a pub feeling.

Theydon Bois Drama Society took on the challenge of performing three of Alan Bennett's Talking Heads monologues. These require three actors to be alone on stage for 40 minutes telling these wonderfully crafted, comedic monologues all with poignancy and painful twists. The performers did great justice to the master of observation and phraseology.

The mysterious Bracken Moor was brought to Lopping Hall by Loughton Amateur Drama society a play by Alexi Kaye Campbell. This dark drama about the aftermath of a tragic accident was very thought provoking and a fine piece of theatre.

CADOS came leaping out of the can in song and dance with their version of Hairspray at Mornington Hall in Chingford. They doubled up for three of the leads with two actors playing each Tracy, Velma and Edna. They divvied up the lines and songs and merged in and out of scenes and sometimes appeared together. It was very innovative but worked very well.

November brought two plays and a musical.

Loughton Operatic Society gave an excellent version of Carousel with some outstanding singing throughout the company. A live band and a cast of over 30, including children, filled the Lopping Hall stage with wonderful harmonies and some solos of the very highest standard.

This Autumn both IODS and HMM have branched out from their regular musical offerings and into straight plays. IODS's Murder in Play by Simon Brett and HMM's Waiting for God were new departures but performed with great skill and discipline. It is often a great learning opportunity for musical theatre performers to take on non-singing roles and both these casts rose to the challenge skilfully and with great success.

We are looking forward to Woodford Pantomime's return with Cinderella and Theydon Bois Drama Society's Robin Hood in January. Both companies are well known in their areas for wonderful Pantomimes and the crowds will be out no doubt in full force. LADS will be giving us the four-hander version of 39 Steps.

Then it is 2023 and the seasons roll on.

London District 7 Report – Paul Holgate

As you know I have been providing cover for District 7 for some while now (having been the Reg Rep for District 7 a few years ago – so I know you all well). We did have a Regional representative in place but unfortunately, owing to personal circumstances he has had to take a sabbatical for a while.

One highlight of the shows that I have seen, was Garden Suburb Theatre's open-air performance of James and the Giant Peach. Little Oak Wood was the perfect setting for this captivating story.

ELOD's autumn show was that quintessential English musical Me and My Girl, with first-time director Mitchel Lathbury doing a sterling job. In a busy week, I also found time to cover for LADS in LO6 who were staging Alexi Kaye Campbell's atmospheric ghost tale Bracken Moor.

Recently, I have been to see another enchanting tale of woodland creatures: HGO's production of Leoš Janáček's opera, The Cunning Little Vixen which was performed in the original Czech.

London District 8 Report - Tony Austin

District 8 has started to feel loved again with the reopening of the Winston Churchill Theatre in September - somewhat delayed by the chaos left by the vaccinators, including the stage curtains which emerged from under the stage with mouse damage and had to be replaced by Hillingdon Council.

Ruislip OS performed the second show there with an impressive production of Stephen Schwartz's *Children of Eden*, the only musical I have seen where all the Direction, Musical Direction and almost all the Choreography was done by the same person, Anthony Wilson, who also deserved the extra title of Fight Director for the realistic Cain and Abel fight in Act 1, superbly mirrored in Act 2 by Japheth and Ham. They will celebrate their Centenary next year with *Crazy for You* (March 29th to April 1st) and *White Christmas* in November.

As I write this in early November, the deluge is due to start soon with the first fully staged show from Harefield ADS since 2019 *Agatha Crusty and the Pantomime Murders* after their sold-out Murder Mystery one-night stand in April, while Ruislip DS make a very welcome return next in the parade of slaughters with *Murdered to Death*, planned before the lockdown. At the end of the month Rickmansworth Players are putting on *Calendar Girls the Musical*, with Bishopshalt School following shortly with *Little Shop of Horrors*, while January should bring relief and laughter with Pantos by both Arrow Players and Argosy Players.

Unfortunately, Harefield ADS had to postpone their Agatha Crusty play as some of the cast had gone down with Covid!! Just when we think it's all under control!!!!

A plea to all in the District after log-jams of productions in late April and early May in several recent years: please try to spread your Spring dates so we can all enjoy The Coronation.

London District 9 – Carole Baynes

HARROW OPERA: Having recently completed their joyful production of "Die Fledermaus" Harrow Opera are already in rehearsal for their next popular production - the glorious "The Magic Flute" which will be playing at the Compass Theatre in Ickenham in May 2023.

KLOS MUSICAL THEATRE: KLOS has just successfully presented the joyful musical "Me and My Girl" after a gap of over two and a half years due to the pandemic and the loss of their venue (as it became a designated vaccination centre). After a couple of attempts to present "Sister Act" which they had been rehearing before lockdown - this show was placed on the 'back burner' until the cast and crew were free to return. At last KLOS are planning to bring their "Sister Act" to the Winston Churchill stage (Ruislip) in early April 2023. This will be their third attempt so let's hope there are no unforeseen hitches. The CHAMELEONS ADS: Following a successful run of "Vicar of Dibley in July.

The Chameleons have not reconvened - other than for social gatherings. The pantomime that the company normally presents over the Christmas period has not been planned this year as they were unable to

acquire their usual venue and a suitable alternative could not be found. Following the winter panto the company usually work towards a play in the early summer - but as yet no specific production has been announced.

PUMP HOUSE THEATRE COMPANY: In October PHTC celebrated their 50th Anniversary a few weeks after an enjoyable performance of the final episodes of the "Blackadder Goes Forth" series - very sensitively recreated by this excellent team. The company was originally formed to do challenging innovative theatre and they try to honour this with "crowd pleasers" in between, to keep them afloat. Their next production "City of Champions" by Steve Brown is one such strong, powerful, challenging play. This drama goes behind the glitz and glamour of Tinseltown to expose a modern day Sodom & Gomorrah. Auditions for "City of Champions" are at the end of November and it will play mid April 2023.

WOS PRODUCTIONS: WOS are pleased to announce that they will finally be returning to Winston Churchill Theatre, Ruislip, in February 2023 presenting the delightful musical comedy parody "The Drowsy

Chaperone". The 'man in the chair' reminisces whilst he plays recordings of his favourite show from the 1920s. As he does so, the show magically comes alive in his room. I am sure many of us remember Elaine Paige playing the titular role in the West End, back in 2007 and I saw Steve Pemberton 'in the chair' (when he replaced co-author Bob Martin)-it was such fun! A really entertaining show which I am sure the full company will enjoy working on. WOS' last couple of presentations - a compilation of Christmas songs last year and a Music Hall presentation "I Say, I Say, I Say" in the Spring- have been performed by just a few of the members (as Wospians). Hopefully the full membership will be involved in this forthcoming production

District 10 – Iain Fowles

As we enter the Autumn season, and pantomimes are truly upon us (oh yes they are!) I have been lucky enough to see 8 productions so far: -

Belmont Theatre

Two vey contrasting plays – 'The Ride Down Mount Morgan' and 'Pygmalion'. Both plays were a joy to watch, with cast and direction being first class. Belmont also celebrated their 75th Birthday this year – many, many congratulations.

Potters Bar Theatre Company

'Ladies is Lavender' an underrated play, very well presented at a new and challenging venue. I look forward to seeing 'Kipps' in November.

Abbotts Langley Players

'Entertaining Angels' what a delightful and insightful play this is – well worth looking at. The staging, although simple was very well conceived.

Kings Langley Players

Again, two very contrasting plays – 'Mindgame' and '5 Lesbians eating a Quiche'. From a phycological drama to a high-spirited piece. Very different, equally enjoyable with some very good acting. The addition of the cocktail bar in the foyer certainly makes for a great evening.

Radlett Musical Theatre Company

It was lovely to be back at The Radlett Centre for 'The Little Mermaid' – a really challenging production, that proved to be a risk well worth taking, with some really outstanding performances.

Green Room

'Young Frankenstein' another much underrated musical, beautifully presented by Green Room. A truly stunning production, with several standout performances, hard to believe that it was an amateur production.

I'm very much looking forward to seeing 'Shrek' by St. Albans Musical Theatre, Abbots Langley's 'Farndale Murder Mystery' and Kings Langley's 'Dick Whittington'. We've also welcomed a new company in St James Music and Drama – Welcome!

Banbury Operatic Society is celebrating its 60th anniversary, and I was privileged to attend their autumn concert, "There's No Business like Show Business". It was remarkable that the company for the concert included founding members of the Society as well as new members making their first appearances — and I understand that the long service of many members of the Society was recognised through NODA Awards. Congratulations to you all. Abingdon Operatic Society and the The Sinodun Players have also acknowledged the contribution of their members through NODA long service awards in recent months.

I was back in Banbury last weekend to see "Moana Jr" staged by Avocet Theatre Company – another group providing wonderful opportunities for young people to get involved in music and drama. The Company's next production will be the pantomime, "Sleeping Beauty", scheduled to be staged in June next year. A summer pantomime is a new concept to me, but why not? And if you can't wait until then, Faringdon Dramatic Society's version of "The Sleeping Beauty" and The Sinodun Players' production of "Jack and the Beanstalk" both open in January.

Just as pantomime is migrating to the summer, musicals are taking over the stage in the post-Christmas period, with Oxford Operatic Society's production of "Evita" opening at the Oxford Playhouse in January. The following month, Banbury Operatic Society is showing that it is moving with the times by producing "Ghost – The Musical". And just in case you thought that plays have been completely marginalised in District 12, I am looking forward to seeing The Bartholomew Players' staging of "Rutherford and Son" as November turns into December.

London District 13 - Cate Naylor

It has been a busy Autumn so far and as well as revisiting societies, I have had the pleasure of meeting two new societies putting on their first show since the pandemic.

The season started quietly with two shows in September. First a return visit to Progress Theatre for Jeeves and Wooster in Perfect Nonsense which was a hilariously funny three hander with lots of role changing and madcap humour. At the end of September, Aldermaston Players put on Number 13, the Luckiest Guesthouse, a play written by one of their members which interwove self-contained stories of people who stayed there. The society were very excited to premier this play and to recognise the playwright. Thank you to Rob Birtwistle who reviewed this as I was away.

In October, I was kept very busy watching nine productions in the district. First up was an energetic production of Our House at Shinfield Players Theatre. After two delays due to the pandemic and a further due to Storm Eunice and lots of recasting, it was great to see the show finally make it to the stage. Following that I saw another fun musical The Wedding Singer from NOMADS in Newbury; their first show since the pandemic. It was lovely to meet the chairman and vice chair of the society at a drink's reception before the show. Both of these musicals had large casts with everyone clearly enjoying being back on stage after so long and having fun.

My next show was The Pride at Progress Theatre and was quite a contrast. It was dark and challenging dealing with perceptions and attitudes to homosexuality in 1958 and 2008 and I commend the director and actors for sensitively dealing with, at times, very unsettling content.

This was followed by another musical; Pippin performed by Reading Operatic Society. I had not seen this musical before and thoroughly enjoyed it. There were some very strong performers and an amazing set.

Another contrast, and my next show Ladies in Lavender performed by The Henley Players transported me to post-war Cornwall. This play was beautifully done with strong performances and a clever stage which provided each room in the house and the garden as well as the Cornish coastline.

Following that, I joined the youth group Starmaker for their performance of Into the Woods Junior. This was a challenging musical for the youngsters, as singing Sondheim is no easy task, but they had obviously worked hard to master the lyrics and harmonies and approached it with enthusiasm and some very strong performances.

After that my final musical of the month was Made in Dagenham from the Sainsbury Singers. I did not review this one as my husband was the MD, but I enjoyed accompanying Andrew Walter (District 12) who did. The singers gave a brilliant performance of this powerful true story.

I finished the month with two very contrasting plays. First up was Waiting for God, Mortimer Dramatic Society's first production since the pandemic. The play was based on the television programme and the actors were very entertaining as the cantankerous and sometimes challenging residents of the BayView Retirement Home. It was lovely to finally join their audience, and I was made very welcome.

My last show was First Love is the Revolution. A fringe production from HAODS in Henley. This play was loosely based on Romeo and Juliet, but the Montagues and Capulets were replaced by a human family and a family of foxes! It was an immersive piece of drama on a traverse stage and excellently done with very strong performances from the whole cast.

Please do keep on inviting me to your shows, I am really enjoying meeting you all and seeing a huge variety of genres and productions. We have such a lot of talent in the district, and I look forward to seeing many more productions.

London District 14 – Nick Humby

As 2022 draws to a close some societies are still struggling to get fully back operationally with casts unwilling to commit to full blown productions, venue issues and financial pressures on members and

audiences. The joy felt by cast and audiences when they do get together is wonderful to behold and hopefully 2023 will move us closer to normality.

Crowthorne Musical Players staged an excellent one night only Tribute to Sondheim in September. The show was charmingly compered with reflections from the cast on when they had sung Sondheim or which parts they aspire to play, accompanied very well by the Musical Director on a grand piano and beautifully lit.

EBOS staged an ambitious A slice of Saturday as a fund raising (putting on a show in 24 hours) event in October followed by an excellent Young Frankenstein at the Wilde Theatre in November. It is a perfect adult amateur musical show in which the cast and audience can have great fun and the EBOS team threw themselves full heartedly into the production to create a first-class show.

Colnbrook Amateur Stage presented A Class Re.ACT.ivation, a revue show in October. The six shows chosen were the pop concert style hit from 2017, Six, the classic 1950's musical Guys and Dolls, the recent rather moving Dear Evan Hansen, the wonderful sexy Chicago from 1975, the brilliantly grim Sweeney Todd from 1980 and the rather black comedy from 2010, Heathers. A great credit to the society.

The pre-Christmas Pantomimes season includes Merlin from **Riverside Players** and Beauty and the Beast from **Maidenhead Drama Guild** with Cinderella from **CAST** and Rapunzel from **Wraysbury Players** in January .

ROCK ON WITH SONGS FROM THE SHOWS – A MINEFIELD?

Compilation shows are great fun and enormously popular with societies and audiences alike – great revenue earners. However, for the unwary they can be a minefield, so be careful and do your research thoroughly on the permissions you must obtain beforehand.

What you can't do are DISNEY songs and ABBA songs – see the NODA Factsheet.

How to go about obtaining permissions?

- Check that the venue has a PRS Licence
- Check IN **DETAIL** the NODA Factsheet
 - This gives COMPREHENSIVE advice on how to go about checking and obtaining the correct performance rights and keep the right side of the copyright laws

DISTRICT 10 – BELMONT THEATRE COMPANY – 75TH ANNIVERSARY

They were nomads over the years, initially performing at St Michael's Church hall near Belmont Circle, Harrow. It was certainly back to basics, having to put the chairs out before the performance and put them back after. Interval teas were served through a hatch. The venue was cold and suffering major subsidence problems. The rehearsals were held in a local school, complete with the usual officious caretaker! Memorable shows there were 'Blitz' 'The Diary of Anne Frank' The National Health' with a multitude of hospital beds and the only pantomime that Belmont have ever performed 'Robinson Crusoe'. Their original venue

finally succumbed to the subsidence and is now a block of flats (what else)

Their rehearsals then moved to The Harrow Arts Centre, Harrow Weald, it was great to be part of the Arts community of Harrow.

The Arts Centre itself then relocated to Hatch End, just behind what is now Morrisons where they put on productions in the intimate Travellers Studio and the impressive Elliott Hall. Great atmosphere in the bar and the scenery storage area which was shared with other theatre groups.

It was then that they embarked on their memorable large scale musicals to sell out audiences. 250 seater venue.' Oliver!' 'Christmas Carol' 'Rock Nativity'. For Christmas Carol they hired huge scenery trucks, so large they had to take the door frames off to get them in. It was a listed building!

In 2007 they moved to The Pump House Theatre and Arts Centre in Watford and are well settled in their venue, where they have built up a loyal enthusiastic audience base. Their first production there had 50% audience and they worked extremely hard to build up our local loyal audience.

They became members of NODA many years ago and have enjoyed that support throughout the years. They have received numerous awards which are proudly displayed FOH, including best Actor and Actress for Journey's End and Bothered and Bewildered respectively.

On their celebration evening they were pleased to welcome Jacquie and David Stedman, Pam Armstrong and Paul Holgate, from NODA London. It was great to see them and we thank them for their continued support.

The evening started with a drink for guests as they arrived, allowing everyone to mingle and look at the many photographs dating back to the 50's. Photograph albums and programmes were available to see all the past productions, cast and the all important crew.

Fee-fi-fo-fum! It's time for Thame Players' pantomime ... not forgetting the Dame!

"Fee-fi-fo-fum!
I smell the blood of an Englishman. Be he alive, or be he dead, I'll grind his bones to make my bread."

So says the Ogre in Jack and the Beanstalk, a favourite amongst pantomimes, opening at the Players Theatre Thame on

Friday 2nd December.

The story goes back to the eighteenth century (and some research shows it goes back much earlier): *The Story of Jack Spriggins and the Enchanted Bean* appeared in 1734, but the version used today is based on Joseph Jacobs' retelling in *English Fairy Tales* in 1890.

In Thame Players' version of this well-known fairy tale, the hero is Jack, a poor country boy, who trades the family's cow for magic beans. The beans grow into a towering beanstalk. When Jack climbs the beanstalk, he finds himself in the castle of an unfriendly Ogre. Jack is hopelessly in love with the Princess, and determined to defeat the Ogre, who is huge and threatening and wants to eat humans for breakfast, assisted by his henchman Stinkweed. Of course, Jack outwits the Ogre, assisted by Sweet Pea, the fairy, and various other characters including Robin Hood and some of his Merry Men – and even the Brothers Grimm of fairy-tale fame!

Another of the characters we could not be without in any self-respecting pantomime is the Dame. In this production of *Jack and the Beanstalk*, the Dame is played by Tony Long and this year is special, because it will mark his 30th performance as the Dame. Tony took the role over when there was a vacancy in the early 1980s, created by the departure of Roger Smith, who had played the Dame for many years. Tony's first Dame role was in *Cinderella* in 1984 and he hasn't looked back since! He says, "Every year I go to the panto auditions and every year I wonder if someone else will show flair for the role and knock me off my perch. But while I'm still fit enough, I'll keep auditioning and keep hoping to get the part." He added, "For me the panto is the highlight of the year. I thoroughly enjoy all the roles I play but Pantomime Dame is without doubt my favourite."

Thame Players' *Jack and the Beanstalk* is co-directed by Colleen Tudway and Steve Lambell, themselves veterans of many a pantomime. They said, "We couldn't be more delighted than to be celebrating Tony's 30th appearance as the Dame in this year's panto, he is always a big hit with audiences, and is without doubt one of the best exponents of the role. Long may he continue."

The plot would not be complete without the Dame, and of course, the corny jokes which will have you groaning and laughing in your seat, the singing and dancing routines and all the elements we expect and look forward to every year ... It all adds up to great family entertainment and audiences are guaranteed to have a brilliant time. — oh, yes, they will!

Tickets are selling fast, so if you want to see *Jack and the Beanstalk* at the Players Theatre from 2nd December, act now to be sure of a seat – oh, yes, you should!

Commissioning a new Musical in the Amateur World -

FLAMES OF INJUSTICE......continued

Four years ago I was chatting to one of our panel of regular MDs about our centenary in 2022 and he said,



"If you really want to celebrate why don't you write your own musical?" At the time I wrote off the idea as being so unlikely as to be not worth thinking about but the seed had been sown and it just needed the right conditions to germinate. I did get as far as consulting our local historian about the dramatic events in our town's history that could be turned in to a theatrical performance and I even wrote some fairly pathetic lyrics for a song. However, my epiphany came when I realised we would need professional help and I thought about Sarah Osborne. I did a Devising Drama course at NODA Summer School one year, with Sarah at the helm and was so impressed I thought who better to ask to help us.

To my surprise and delight Sarah said she would facilitate a weekend workshop, or rather two whole days of workshops, in Witham where my group rehearses and performs. I gave her the source material about James Cooke and the Witham Fires of 1828 and Sarah guided about 14 members of Witham Amateur Operatic Society (WAOS) through a series of drama games and exercises that culminated in us having a strong narrative for the story, the order of the scenes and what should happen in each one, the named characters of the piece and even the characterisation for each role. Oh, and we had a working title, *The Flames of Injustice* which we kept for the actual show.

It was agreed that we would ask Sarah to write the play while the committee at WAOS gave some thought to potential composers. A number of tentative approaches were made to musicians we knew but the musician that was most enthusiastic was Frankie Garland, who had been an accompanist for us in the past and joined our cast for a couple of shows subsequently. By the end of 2019 we had a script and during lockdown in 2020 we held half a dozen Zoom calls to put together the bare bones of lyric ideas for over 20 songs, from which Sarah then wrote the final lyrics. These were passed to Frankie who created the tunes and some of the basic harmonies. The musical baton was then passed to Phil Toms who created the vocal harmonies and the orchestration for six instruments.

The summary of this process sounds like it was easy but there were definite issues along the way, mostly relating to changing work priorities of people who had a living to make. Despite this we made it to Day 1 of the pre-audition rehearsal with a completed piano vocal score and several recordings of a few chorus numbers and soloist songs with backing tracks all done in a professional recording studio. The idea was to intrigue our members with some lovely music and get them to commit to a brand new show for the next six months. We were lucky that two talented young women, Rhi Howard and Jessie Tabor were keen to

direct and direct the music respectively. Without their vision, skill and patience we would not have achieved our fantastic final result.

I am still waiting to see the edited video of the dress rehearsal but I have few doubts that, warts and all, it will be a fitting and lasting tribute to the hard work and energy of the cast, creatives and production team of *The Flames of Injustice*, as well as giving James Cooke his day in the court of public opinion almost 200 years after his execution, aged 16.



Paul Cozens – an amateur theatrical legend

A Tribute by Cloe Robertson on behalf of Centre Stage, Geoids and Sedos – London District 1

Theatre groups around London have been coming together to mourn and celebrate Paul Cozens, a huge personality on and off stage, whose unexpected loss earlier this month has shocked and saddened us all. Paul was a stalwart member of various societies including Sedos, Geoids, Centre Stage and Mayhem; and his participation and support was a joyful and welcome presence in dozens and dozens of shows.

A prolifically talented man, Paul always seemed to be up to so many things at any given time that it's hard to single out examples of his work, whether as a performer, a Musical Director or as a musician.

At the baton for Centre Stage, he MD'd not only some of the most memorable big shows, including Copacabana (2003), The Wedding Singer (2011), Our House (2012) and The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas (2014); he also brought his encyclopaedic knowledge of musical theatre and crazy sense of humour to bear, as he and I reimagined their beloved fundraiser cabarets into the indulgent Guilty Pleasures (2010) and the even more anarchic Ghoooooulty Pleasures (2011). He performed for Centre Stage in HMS Pinafore (2002), A Slice of Saturday Night (2003), Hot Mikado (2005), Dames at Sea (2005), Anything Goes

(2006) and I Heart Centre Stage (2007). CentreStager David Walker-Smith, who shared the stage with many times, remembers him as "a great fun musical genius"; while his long time friend Nick Lane described him as "the most lovely, caring guy with a great big heart and equally well-endowed sense of humour." Alexis Rose, Centre Stage's President, said 'Paul was a much loved and massively talented member of Centre Stage and a true stalwart of the London amateur theatre scene. His loss will be deeply felt by his countless friends, fellow performers and creatives.'

Geoids were gifted with his particularly close creative partnership with Cara Turtington for their pitch-perfect production of The Pyjama Game (2017), MD'd by Paul, in his own inimitable style, in a onesie! As well as his being at the helm for their ravishing 'Top Hat' (2018). Dan Paul, Secretary of Geoids Musical Theatre highlighted the passion Paul brought to all his projects, saying his involvement in any and every show was 'wonderful'.

For Sedos, Paul created a number of memorable onstage characters, including Governor (Candide, 2016), Mr Carney (A Man of No Importance, 2013) and Judge Roan (Parade, 2009); as well as joining the company for Sedos' UK and London Amateur premier production of Rent (2007). His partnership with me gave rise to The Wild Party (2009) and The Show Off (2014). And, as with so many other societies, Paul's prodigious musical ability saw him as a fixture in the pit, audition and rehearsal rooms of just about every other musical going. Matt Gould, Sedos' Chair, paid tribute to Paul's talent, passion and love of performing, saying 'He is an immeasurable loss to the London Amateur Theatre Scene, and to each of us personally who knew and loved him.'

Like so many of us, Paul found the enforced absence from the stage during COVID a struggle. Friends were glad to hear that he had found his way back, playing for Mayhem's recent production of 9 to 5. Mayhem paid tribute to Paul's talent and commitment, saying he will be sorely missed.

Paul was a giant hug of a person, who had an unrivalled ability to make performers around him feel safe, empowered and passionate to find and exploit their own potential. His generosity was legendary, as was his ability to bring any room, gathering or party to life. In common with many, many people, I feel profoundly lucky to have been able to work with him; and deeply honoured to call him my friend. He has left a huge hole in the world, and all our thoughts, condolences and love go to his parents, Kay and Geoff, along with our thanks for raising such a bloody legend.
