District Round-up – News from around the Region

London District 1 – Matt Bentley

They tell me summer is a quiet time for most societies with autumn getting busier. It turns out the exact opposite was the case this year for District 1. June and July were unusually busy with an average of one production per week. Compare that with September and October, which averaged one every three weeks. Nevertheless, while the quantity has been low, the quality has been exceptionally high.

Geoids produced two musicals in less than two months. The delightfully quirky 25th Annual *Putnam County Spelling Bee* featured some exceptional performances, and was a joy to see given how rarely it is able to be performed. *Spring Awakening* was an emotional roller-coaster with a stunning aesthetic and some extraordinary company numbers.

Sedos lovingly recreated the excellent movie *Clue* in an adaptation made for the stage, with plenty of theatrical innovations that kept the essence of the film and added plenty of fresh magic. This also included a live score created specifically for this production, which was an absolute treat.

Many thanks to Robin Kelly who stepped in to report on New Stagers' production of *The Ladykillers*, an adaptation of another iconic film. Robin had nothing but excellent things to say about this production and I was sorry to miss it. For the record, I was aboard the SS American, setting sail as Eli Whitney in Mayhem's production of *Anything Goes* - the unsinkable musical which contrasts beautifully with Sedos's production of *Titanic* which, at the time of writing, has just left port and I can't wait to see it.

Finally, I most recently saw Centre Stage's production of *Holiday Inn*. This was a joyous festive triumph and I was pleased to grin from start to finish. The talent on display here, both on and off stage, was abundant. The concept of the production, though, was strikingly simple showing that with a bit of creativity you can stage a big, bold show while remaining resourceful.

And so the end of year festivities are nearly upon us. After *Titanic* I will be attending a few pantos and then jetting home for a sunny Christmas period. Thank you so much to all the District 1 societies for an excellent year. Have a fantastic holiday and I can't wait to see what you have in store for us in 2024.

Julian Light Opera Society performed their annual show – this year it was Iolanthe. Although I was unable to attend, I understand it was a very successful production, much appreciated by all. Preparations are already in hand for 2024, when they will be performing Ruddigore at the Questors Theatre.

Something very different to end 2023 for Beaufort Players. An original interactive murder mystery experience – with food!! - and billed as "A Deadly Influence"

A unique murder mystery evening, following the action, deciphering the clues and interrogating the suspects. All this with a two-course dinner!

A home-grown script written by Thomas Cobb, the Players' Chairperson. I'm sure this will be a great production.

I must just mention how much I enjoyed my visit to Sunbury, District 3, to see Zodiac Musical Society perform Godspell. I'm certainly going to try and get to see their next show – "Holly Jolly Christmas".

London District 3

I deputised in District L03 on 14 October 2023 at HLO Musical Company's production of **THE GONDOLIERS**. It was a pleasure to cover and my thanks to Laurie for the invitation, their committee Chair, Elizabeth and her volunteers for their very warm welcome to Hampton Hill Theatre on the day and to John, for the quick backstage tour after the cast had cleared between shows. <u>www.hlo.org.uk</u>

I had a second opportunity to deputise in District L03 on Sunday 18 November 2023 for Carlton Theatre Group's production of **THE FLINT STREET NATIVITY**. The venue on this occasion was the Studio at New Wimbledon Theatre and my sincere thanks to Joseph's colleagues for their hospitality during my visit. <u>www.carltontheatregroup.co.uk</u>

While mentioning District LO3, I would like to welcome their newly appointed Regional Representative, Stuart James, to our regional team. I look forward to meeting him in person.

District 1 rep Matt was blown away by the talent present in Cygnet Players' production of *Little Women*. This was a brave production that took a lot of risks, but which kept coming back to the core cast and their excellent interpretations of the classic characters. Matt is also very pleased to welcome Stuart to the team as the new District 3 rep, having known him since they were both directing theatre in Wellington, New Zealand about 15 years ago.

District 4 Representative Robin Kelly was fortunate in being able to report on the Barnes Community Players Alan Bennett double bill of Cocktail Sticks (before its visit to the Edinburgh Festival) and Two in Torquay, luxuriating in the fabulous Bennett dialogue. A more recent treat (or trick?!) was a trip to the WLOS compilation show for Hallowe'en – "A Little Show of Horrors" which proved once again how much strength in depth exists in the society.

London District 4 – Robin Kelly.

With the summer now a distant memory, District 4 groups have been getting into their stride. Sadly, the one exception to this has been Dartford Amateur Operatic & Dramatic Society (DAODS) whose October production of Chitty Chitty Bang Bang was cancelled when the Orchard Theatre was discovered to be affected by RAAC. To be fair, Dartford Council swung into action very quickly, brought forward previously planned work and a temporary theatre is currently under construction – but will not be suitable for a major production, particularly one with a flying car. Meanwhile on the other side of the district, Bromley Council have decided to divest themselves of the responsibility for maintaining the Churchill Theatre, which happens to be the venue for West Wickham Operatic Society (WWOS) twice yearly productions. With the theatre now over fifty years old, a degree of TLC is required. Commercial operatives who it is proposed will take over have made assurances that the theatre will be maintained. However concerns remain as to how binding such assurances will be when the true cost of maintenance issues emerges.

Productions seen since the last District 4 Report have ranged from Carrie the Musical (Bromly Players) to the similarly bloody Lieutenant of Inishmore (Bob Hope Theatre). For lighter relief, there was The Haunted Through Lounge and Recessed Dining Nook at Farndale Castle (The Priory Players) and A Bunch of Amateurs (Eldorado Musical Productions). The Mick Jagger Centre in Dartford was a new venue for both me and Swanley Light Opera Group for Agatha Christie's The Hollow. In contrast, Erith Playhouse presented a moving production of Hamp, timing with Remembrance Day week.



District 4 societies such as WWOS, Bromley Players and Bob Hope Theatre have been devastated by the untimely death of Kemal Ibrahim as a result of post operative complications following brain surgery. Kemal was 2022 London Regional Winner of the Ken Wirdnam award for Best Male in a Musical for his portrayal of Lola in the WWOS production of Kinky Boots (a role he went on to reprise with COS Musical Theatre). A hugely talented actor, singer, director and choreographer, Kemal was smart, funny and, most

importantly, immensely kind. At the time of writing, a GoFundMe page to finance a Celebration and Memorial had raised a staggering £13,375. Our heartfelt condolences go to his family and many friends. He was just 43. Kemal was in the process of directing the Bob Hope Theatre pantomime, a task made so much more daunting by being taken over by his great friend Mims Melville. The show must go on – which is exactly as Kemal would have wanted.

London District 5 – Phil Wilcox

Since my last round-up, I have been invited to see three varying productions. The first, a very entertaining original revue put on by Woodmansterne Operatic and Dramatic Society, *Diiing Dong*, was written and directed by one of its many talented members, Deanne Weller.

Described as "a musical review about finding love", the show refreshingly mainly veered away from the

"tried and trusted" material from the usual hackneyed shows. Instead, it included some very witty songs from the likes of *Heathers, Jekyll And Hyde, Schmigadoon, Bonnie And Clyde, First Date The Musical* and a showstopper performed by the director herself, *Screw Loose* from *Cry Baby*. This is a musical which I have to confess I had not previously come across. Secondly, the ever-reliable Mayhem Theatre Company mounted a spectacular production of *Anything Goes*, with the usual line-up of gifted actors and singers, plus some top notch dancers.

Sadly, illness prevented me from attending CODA's version of *The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe*, featuring a mainly youthful cast. However, my colleague Robin Kelly kindly stepped in at the eleventh hour and has written a very comprehensive report.

Now, it almost time for my panto companies to "strut their stuff". Oh, yes it is!

London District 6 – Paul Daynes

This Autumn, District 6 audiences have been treated to some lesser-known plays, musicals and reviews. To start their centenary season, LADS performed Time of My Life, an Alan Ayckbourn play with many of his classic ingredients such as family feuds and time travel. Unusually perhaps this performance had two real life couples playing an engaged and a married couple on stage, which must have made learning lines more convenient.

Alan Ayckbourn has written and published eighty-nine plays but amateur companies tend to stick to the well-known top ten, so it was refreshing once again to see IODS's production of Ten Times Table. This is a funny and at times farcical play about a committee trying to organise a local pageant. The politics of the committee is well portrayed and then the re-enactment of the battle of the Pendon Twelve provides a lively ending.

The Woodhouse Players performed the four hander Hello Goodbye by Peter Souter, better known for radio shows. This clever comedy was last played in Hampstead in 2015 and the script was chased down by Director Neil Bird to bring it the Welsh Church Hall in Leytonstone. The play relies heavily on the two leads and, in Ashleigh Cole and Iain Prest, Woodhouse had two excellent actors which brought the pathos and comedy off the script and onto the stage.

Another gem was shined and displayed by HMM for their version of Play On! by Rick Abbott. If any group is looking for a new comedy, I would recommend Play On! Written for 7 women and 3 men it's a very funny and accessible play showing the rehearsals and performance of a mystery play. It has a nod to The Play that Goes Wrong but with a proper plot and relationships that hold the piece together.

WP Drama's November production was the better-known Ladies' Day by Amanda Whittington, which provides four fantastic comic parts for women and a handful of cameos for men. When the Hull fish packers decide to have a day at the races, they are exposed to an unfamiliar environment that unravels some long-held secrets. Paula Brett Harris directed this super play with some fine acting that provided a great night at the theatre.

Theydon Bois Drama Society went to the other end of the continuum with the instantly recognisable The Vicar of Dibley that brought in a sell-out run of three nights. The familiar characters were well impersonated and the laugh out loud moments rolled along continuously.

On the musical front we have had CADOS with Betty Blue Eyes and Forest Musical Theatre Company with Seussical. Based on Alan Bennett's A Private Function, Betty Blue Eyes takes us back to post war rationing and a style of 1940s' songs to match. A large cast filled Mornington Hall with song and dance but the star of the show was Betty, a sizeable puppet Pig designed and made superbly by CADOS member David Pinnell. Any company thinking of performing this show would do well to contact CADOS re Betty. David has submitted an article about Bettys creation later in this edition.

Seussical is one of the most frequently performed shows in the USA but is less often seen in London. Forest Musical Theatre Company returned to Ilford's Kenneth More Theatre for a fabulously colourful and energetic production of the Dr Suess inspired musical. Bizarre characters meet in strange lands and enact the peculiar story. Wonderful performances provided a high-quality show with a many excellent singers.

Songs from the shows were presented in HMM's Come to the Cabaret and LOS's Truesical which used musicals based on true stories to theme a wonderful evening's entertainment at Lopping Hall in Loughton.

And Finally...

The Renegades Theatre Company had a well deserved festival win in the final of Short+Sweet Essex in September. They won the People's choice for Best Production for The Home Furnishings Department written by Renegade member William Patterson and featuring Tim Murphy and Craig Witney. Many congratulations.

London District 7 – Thomas Lennon

I'm delighted to say the past few months have been busy.

For my second outing of the month, on Friday 27 October 2023, I found myself in Harley Hall for Mill Hill Musical Theatre Company's production of Dolly Parton's **9 TO 5** - **The Musical**. They had a very supportive full house on the evening and it was great to finally put faces with names for some of the MHMTC committee and membership. I look forward to making a return visit in the not-too-distant future. Their next event will be their Patrons' Party in March 2024 to begin the celebrations for their Platinum Jubilee. www.mhmtc.co.uk

My only West End outing for October was to see the new musical, **THE TIME TRAVELLER'S WIFE** at the Apollo Theatre. The extremely effective use of projections throughout the show made this a very memorable production. Well worth the trip!

As you know, I regularly advocate the support of neighbouring societies in the surrounding districts. I had therefore booked to attend a production of Irving Berlin's **HOLIDAY INN** by Green Room Productions, District L10, at Wyllyotts Theatre on 04 November 2023. Regrettably, on the day, travel restrictions prevented me from getting there however, from the feedback I saw online it was very well received by their audiences. I'm sorry I missed it however, I will endeavour to catch

their next production, **BEAUTIFUL** - **The Carole King Musical**, in May 2024. <u>www.greenroomproductions.co.uk</u>

Back in my own district, on Sunday 12 November 2023, my next trip was to Jacksons Lane Theatre for HGO's production of the fairy tale opera **HÄNSEL UND GRETEL** by Engelbert Humperdinck. Some introductions were required on this, my first official visit to this company, though I had previously attended their production of **AGRIPPINA** in May. Thank you to David for his hospitality on the day. Obviously the *'opera of choice'* this year, as in my research it has already featured at Opera Holland Park and is scheduled for both Scottish Opera and Royal Opera House in the coming months. <u>www.hgo.org.uk</u>

A pre-December treat of a mid-month matinee in the West End to see **Stephen Sondheim's OLD FRENDS** at the Gielgud Theatre helped to recharge the batteries ahead of the second half of a busy month on the amateur circuit. A smorgasbord of Sondheim was just the tonic.

My second planned trip to a neighbouring society was to our friends at SEDOS in District LO1 for their production of **TITANIC - The Musical** at Bridewell Theatre on Saturday 25 November 2023. A particular favourite of mine musically, with music and lyrics by Maury Yeston, it captures the triumph and tragedy of the hopeful passengers on the ill-fated Ship of Dreams. The society provide a wide range of plays and musicals annually which generally guarantees at least one trip to The Bridewell in my musical calendar. <u>www.sedos.co.uk</u>

A cheeky last-minute addition to the diary was a trip to Riverside Studios to see **FLOWERS FOR MRS HARRIS** before the end of its run. Well, you can't have an opinion if you haven't seen the production - it must be done. That's my story and I'm sticking to it!

Regrettably, I didn't get a chance to attend Garden Suburb Theatre's production of **MURDER WITH GHOSTS** in mid-October however, I understand it was well supported and received by their patrons. I have since then attended their production of **WYRD SISTERS** on Sunday 26 November 2023 performed Upstairs At The Gatehouse, a different location from my original visit with them in July. They have the most hectic schedule of all the groups within the district so they will keep me on my toes. <u>www.gardensuburbtheatre.org.uk</u>

In the latest e-mail correspondence from Wonder Theatre Training Academy, Joanne advised that they recently returned from a visit to Disneyland Paris with a group of 19 children who had the honour of performing on the main stage. London District 8 Report - Tony Austin

Our District has seen an unusual (and spectacularly successful) collaboration between our **Argosy Players** and District 9's **WOS (formerly Wembley OS)** for *The Wizard of Oz* at our local Theatre, the Winston Churchill in Ruislip where both societies normally play. The societies' collaboration was immaculate. But their requests for a joint report from Carole and myself had to be abandoned when our styles of report proved incompatible (we don't usually see the reports other reps write about their own societies, although Carole has done quite a few for me over the years). However, we agreed on the excellence of the evening and look forward to seeing their next separate productions.

Other things which will be over before you read this are **Ruislip OS**'s last celebration of its Centenary with *White Christmas* and productions by the two societies with Centenaries in 2024, **Proscenium** with *Ladies' Day*, hugely publicised already on Facebook where they are also promising a big scale *Julius Caesar* for March, and *Ruislip DS* just going into Alan Bennett's *Habeas Corpus*, at which I hope to learn more about their plans for next year. **Ricky Players'** *Kipps* and **Bishopshalt School**'s *School of Rock* (with the cast playing their instruments on stage) will keep me on my toes until 2024, when **Harefield ADS**'s postponed home scripted *1940 That Glorious Summer* will slot in just before my Panto Season with **Arrow Players'** *Red Riding Hood* and **Argosy's** *Cinderella* sharing some dates.

London District 9 – Carole Baynes

District 9 companies have been busy over the past three months presenting some great entertainment. The Chameleons ADS have been in rehearsal for their up-coming pantomime "Dick Whittington" which plays next month. This will be performed at a different venue (The Church of the Ascension) but remaining in the Wembley district, with Rachel Spolander - one of their leading actresses, at the helm. After the expense of the full scale large cast musical "Sister Act" last spring KLOS decided on a smaller cast musical "Bad Girls - The Musical". Based on the television series, this was in fact totally new to me but was most entertaining and quite inspirational. KLOS found a strong cast of female inmates and the story was cleverly told in music. The following week at Winston Churchill Theatre WOS Productions joined forces with Argosy Players to present the wonderful ever popular "The Wizard of Oz". This was a fantastic show with the large cast being cleverly employed - certainly "The Wizard of Oz" stands the tests of time very well. In the spring 2024, WOS plan to perform a selection of songs that they would not normally have the opportunity to perform . Aptly entitled "Show Offs: Our Musical Daydreams",. this should be a wonderful evening's entertainment in cabaret style at the smaller venue Ickenham Village Hall. Pump House Theatre Company presented the black comedy "Hangmen" in September in which top hangmen of the period discuss how they adjust to life after the abolition of hanging and their attitudes towards past miscarriages of justice. It was strangely entertaining. They have quickly followed this with another play relating to miscarriages of justice but this time during wartime (WW1). This play is based on Michael Morpurgo's story "Private Peaceful" -and PHTC presented the version dramatised for one actor. It played, most pertinently, during Remembrance week, a play that had been much appreciated on social media.

District 10 – Iain Fowles

It's been a really busy Autumn/Winter season, with some fabulous shows, and as always exceptional talent on display.

I have seen some wonderful productions, some highlights include: -

Belmont Theatre

An excellent presentation of a little know Agatha Christie play – Verdict. Well worth considering if your audiences like Agatha Christie.

Potters Bar Theatre Company

Two great productions this season – The perennial favourite 'Allo, 'Allo, just hilarious and a wonderfully clever interpretation of Sondheim's Company.

Kings Langley Players

A very clever in-house production entitled The Darkest Hour – ghostly tales with an unexpected twist, together with a complete contrast of Robin Hood and The Babes in the Wood – a traditional family pantomime – my first of the season and really put me in the festive mood.

Green Room

A colourful, well-acted and choreographed production of Holiday Inn– Green Room continue to keep the standard of amateur theatre at the highest level and strive to push boundaries.

St Albans Musical Theatre Company

A stunning visual production of Elf – The Musical. The amazing video set and colourful costumes really boosted this production.

Centralian Players

A good presentation of the comedy A Bunch Of Amateurs – well acted, with some lovely comedy moments.

Radlett Musical Theatre Company

A production of Legally Blonde, showcasing the wonderful talent that Radlett are lucky to call their membership.

Abbots Langley Players

A double bill of two one act plays – Murder in Little Grimley and Old Folk – a great choice of plays for their cast and venue.

Hemel Hempstead Theatre Company

My own company have been busy with our annual pantomime – Dick Whittington. Over a run of 12 performances, we included two BSL interpreted performances, a relaxed performance and an adult only evening – no guess that the adult performance went down very well with cast and audience.

District 11 and 11a – Judith Watsham

Nearly everyone seems to be gearing up for pantomime as I write this - so best wishes to all who are currently rehearsing!

I am very sorry to report that two long and well established groups, one a NODA member, the other a lapsed member, have had to shut their doors. Amersham Playgoers, who had been running for over 75 years, found it impossible to continue, due in part to problems with their revamped Community Hall which has proved unsuitable for dramatic performances. Lockdown played its part too with younger members no longer prepared to give time for free to running the group. They will be sadly missed in the area. The other group, Beaconsfield Theatre Group, I understand, has had similar problems with membership issues.

Rumours abound that one of the much used local theatrical venues may not be available from 2024 which will be a great loss to the area.

On a much brighter note I have seen some excellent, and theatrically challenging performances in the Districts this autumn both dramatic and musical including Shakespeare's 'Scottish play' from Berkhamsted Theatre Company which was billed as *Macbeth, as you have never seen it*. Certainly the idea of setting it in a jazz club with the witches as jazz singers singing as a preshow entertainment and also during the interval was very different! Also, Lane End Players' *Confusions* was superbly staged 'in the thrust' both artistically and visually.

Keep up the good work!

London District 12 – Andrew Walter

The breadth and depth of the productions staged in District 12 continues to impress and entertain in roughly equal measure. As 2023 draws to a close the pantomime season is almost upon us, and the first seasonal offering is Banbury Cross Players' production of "Cinderella" at The Mill Arts Centre, which opened on 23rd November. This will be the first occasion I have reported on the Banbury Cross Players, and I am very much looking forward to it. There are now only one or two groups in the district that I have not reported on, despite my very best efforts to establish contact: if you are one of these then please email me at <u>andrew.walter@noda.org.uk</u>.

The pantomime season continued with The Thame Players' production of "Aladdin", opening on 1st December; The Sinodun Players' presentation of "The Adventures of Sinbad", opening on 12th January, and Faringdon Dramatic Society's staging of "The Ruby Slippers", opening on 26th January. At least a couple of these pantomimes have been written by Society members, so I was looking forward to plenty of local references and humour. Other genres haven't been completely squeezed out of the picture in the next couple of months: The Bartholomew Players' production of Sandi Toksvig's "Silver Lining" opened on 29th November, and Avocet Theatre Company staged an ambitious programme of work – TheatreFest Banbury – from 6th December. As well as a "play-that-goes-wrong" style version of the Nativity, a showcase for local talent and the teen edition of "Six", the group is offering an inclusive workshop, "Embrace The Stage", which hopes to draw in people who may have thought that the theatre wasn't for them.

Young People with an interest in theatre are particularly well served in North Oxfordshire; apart from Avocet Theatre Company, Odyssey Theatrical Productions runs two groups for younger people, and the Juniors will be staging "The Wind in the Willows" from 11th February. Youth of Banbury Operatic Society, winners of the Youngstars award in 2022, have lined up "School of Rock" as their show-in-a-week in the summer, while a bit further south the Musical Youth Company of Oxford will return to the Oxford Playhouse with a staging of "Me and My Girl" in the spring.

Amongst the plays lined up for early 2024 are The Thame Players' production of "Barefoot in the Park", opening 5th March, and Banbury Cross Players' presentation of "Our Country's Good", opening 21st March. Forthcoming musicals include Abingdon Operatic Society's staging of "9 to 5" (from 9th April), following their ambitious and entertaining production of "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang" this autumn, and Banbury Operatic Society's presentation of "Calamity Jane", which I

expect will present significantly different challenges to their recent powerful production of "Kinky Boots".

Finally, please forgive me for mentioning Oxford Operatic Society's forthcoming production of "Oliver!", which opens at The New Theatre in Oxford on 30th January. This new version of Lionel Bart's classic show was developed for the West End stage about fourteen years ago, and is pure musical entertainment. With 52 adults and 56 children (divided into two teams) in the cast, not to mention the dozens of people involved in the production team and the hundreds ferrying young people to and from rehearsals, it has been a massive effort, as well as an immense privilege, to stage. After almost three years reporting on your productions, I am looking forward to receiving your feedback about this one!

London District 13 – Cate Naylor

The autumn season in District 13 has been very busy and I've seen so many good productions with a lovely mix of plays and musicals. I continue to be impressed by both by the quality of performances and the feeling of camaraderie in the societies as they bring their shows to the stage, and I am so grateful for the wonderful welcome I receive as I travel to different societies.

I began the new season in September at Progress Theatre for the play 'The Effect' in which scientific research and human impulse are explored. This clever play was brilliantly acted by just four actors who gelled together to deliver the play which challenges many of our perceptions about mental health and the nature and nurture of relationships. This was followed by a return trip to Crowthorne Musical Players on behalf of Nick Humby for their show 'One Enchanted Evening of Rodgers and Hammerstein' where I was treated to a wonderful mixture of musical theatre songs from this wonderful writing duo. The evening was full of joy and great singing performances.

October brought with it a very busy month of productions with a great mixture of musical and plays. I began by joining Aldermaston Players for three one act plays; 'Murder Play', 'The Rats' and 'Bang You're Dead' Presented under the umbrella title of 'Consequences'. All three plays worked well together, combining intrigue, dark humour, good acting and twists and turns galore. Next, I was with Twyford and Ruscombe Theatrical Society, this time for two contrasting one act plays; 'The Monkey's Paw' a haunting tale of the supernatural and 'Little Grimley presents Strictly X-Factor on Ice' an hilarious romp with Gordon and Friends. Both casts captured the essence of their plays to deliver two very different but entertaining performances. With a change of genre, I went to Newbury for NOMAD's annual musical theatre production joining them for a brilliant performance of 'Shrek'. This huge cast gave one hundred percent with great singing performances, energetic dancing and perfect characterisations.

This was followed by another musical, this time at Shinfield Players Theatre. Having been delayed twice due to Covid and then Storm Eunice and with a change of cast, Betty Blue Eyes finally made it to the stage, although not without a further challenge, having to cancel one performance due to sickness. The cast gave it their all, with some great performances and huge camaraderie which was evident throughout. This was my last review for SPT as they have now moved into District 14. Thank you for welcoming me over the last two years and I know that you will be well supported by Nick Humby going forward.

My next show was Henley Players' production of 'A Bunch of Amateurs' a brilliantly funny play. All the cast acted their hearts out with natural characterisation, which was never contrived of farcical. I then joined Starmaker one of my youth groups for their energetic performance of 'Cry Baby'. I am always amazed by the talent in this youth group, and it is a joy to watch the youngsters grow in confidence and performance as they experience performing live on stage.

At the end of October, I was treated to two more plays and a musical. First up was 'And Then There Were None' from Mortimer Dramatic Society. This is such a good Agatha Christie murder mystery, and the society developed their characters very well working together to unravel the mystery of Soldier Island. This was followed by a tremendous production of 'The Addams Family' from The Sainsbury Singers. Everyone in the cast worked brilliantly together with great performances from the principals and ensemble alike. The singing was of very high quality and the characterisation perfect for the iconic Addams Family. My last production for October was 'Death and the Maiden' a dark play which mixes politics, psychology and brutality into the story. Dark though the subject matter, the play was brilliantly directed and performed by just three actors leaving me with lots to think about on the way home.

After a quiet November coming up, I am looking forward to Decembers' productions and to panto season starting. District 13 continues to be very active in theatre productions and I am so lucky to be able to enjoy so many of them, thank you!

London District 14 – Nick Humby

Recent Productions

A quieter period with only four shows to report on before the Christmas season begins. Venue and financial pressures continue to stretch societies but on my recent visits audiences and cast membership seems to be on the rise which is positive sign.

Quince Players' Battle of the Age Bands allowed the cast to throw themselves with bags of energy and a patently obvious sense of enjoyment into the eclectic mix of music, sketches, and monologues. It provides an opportunity to showcase the younger society members outside of the annual pantomime and the individual talents of different members as they play multiple roles in the sketches some of which were written by members.

Stage to screen from EBOS at their Pinewood Theatre was like one of those sampler records that showcased a mix of songs from twenty-two musicals from the 1951 Rodgers and Hammerstein hit, *The King and I* to the 2017 Tom McRae show *Everybody talking about Jamie* and might have been called "Now that's what I call ... musical theatre 22 ". It is an interesting and varied selection of songs which showcased the talents of the fourteen singers.

Young Frankenstein from **MMCS** at The Kenton Theatre in Henley provided show stopping opportunities that brought a smile to all the audience and were delivered with excellent routines for the *Brain, Please don't touch me, It could work, Transylvania Mania and Putting on the ritz*. The combination of strong casting, good staging, and attractive choreography together with an excellent musical execution makes for a first-class fun production for cast and audience.



EBOS's Chitty Chitty Bang Bang was a wonderful showcase for the children with huge roles for Jeremy and Jemima and a Junior and children's Ensemble for the army of displaced kids who rally to Potts's call to assault the Palace who at times out shone the principals with their confident and charming performances. The strong relationship between the two children and their father Caractacus Potts, and Truly Scrumptious is crucial and the EBOS team delivered with a delightful believable quartet, especially in the wonderful *Truly Scrumptious* and *Chitty Chitty Bang Bang* songs which closed Act 1. Wonderful that both the National President and London Chair supported this show.

Coming up

In November, **Maidenhead Operatic Society** presented the G & S The Sorcerer and **ShInfield Players**, now transferred to District 14, are staging The Tempest .

The first two pantomimes are **CATS**'s Snow White in Crowthorne while **Riverside player** presented Old Mother Hubbard in Windsor.

In December CAST stage Rapunzel and MDG Snow Queen in Holyport .

In January **Quince Players** present Ba Ba Land in Sunninghill , **Shinfield Players** Rapunzel at their own venue in Reading before **Wraybury Players** present Jack and the Beanstalk.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY ELODS!

In 1953, a group of like-minded friends got together to celebrate their love of theatre, music and performing. Initially known as The Wheatsheaf Players, the society's first contribution to the local theatre scene was Gilbert and Sullivan's *Trial by Jury*. The name was soon changed to Enfield Light Operatic and Dramatic Society. Throughout the 50s and 60s, there was a varied

programme of G & S and Light Opera classics until the society took on the challenge of producing more modern musicals, starting with *The Gypsy Baron* in 1961. These days we tend to just call ourselves ELODS, as we don't currently put on plays or operas!

In the early days, ELODS performed at the much-loved Intimate Theatre in Palmers Green, working in a theatre with an incredible history. Members recall the joys of cramped dressing rooms down steep stairs, applying make-up beneath the stage and, of course, braving the elements by running outside to make an entrance stage right!

1989 saw the company move to the Millfield Theatre - a brand new custom-built theatre, complete with portacabins in the car park for chorus dressing rooms - there only being three principal-sized dressing rooms within the theatre itself. Oh, how we miss those cold rainy nights in November running from the portacabins to the stage door! Thankfully further dressing rooms were forthcoming - LUXURY! But still we had our 'experiences' - not least the time that a runaway bed, complete with its three occupants, ended up with one corner in the orchestra pit! Thanks to the support of the member of the orchestra who valiantly shoved the bed back on stage, the only injury we sustained was a slightly crumpled trombone!

In 2005, ELODS moved to their current home at the Wyllyotts Theatre in Potters Bar, and today we are proud to be part of the thriving Amateur Theatre scene in the area.

For 35 years (half of ELODS' lifetime) we have been privileged to work under the baton of our resident MD, Mark Newport, whose prodigious skill and endless patience brings the very best from everyone involved. Thanks to his ministrations, and those of countless other talented creatives we have worked with over the years, ELODS is much greater than the sum of its parts. Friendship has always been at the heart of ELODS – a group of friends who put on shows together. As we move into our eighth decade ELODS is going strong!

To honour everything that ELODS is and rejoice in its longevity, a platinum jubilee party was celebrated in the auditorium of our home theatre- the Wyllyotts on September the 9th. The event was very well attended by ELODS' members, both old and new and some friends of the society too. The entertainment was top notch, which is only to be expected by a group with talent in abundance!

An unexpected highlight of the evening was a presentation of an award for 70 years' service to the



arts by NODA London Regional Councillor Pam Armstrong.

We now look forward to our future and continuing to bring North London the very finest in amateur musical theatre!

Giving New Writers a Chance!!!



In a corner of east London, members of CADOS (<u>www.cados.org</u>) have formed a new writing group. Along with actors and music makers, the writers are adding another element to the great community theatre presented at Mornington Hall in Chingford

The group originally came together to stage *Creative Streak*, a set of short plays performed as part of the 2022-23 season. Members also credit a devised piece, *The Party* as having sparked their interest in writing –

improvised sessions were held during the development of the show and this started conversations! *Creative Streak* was different to the usual repertoire, since any member of CADOS could submit a piece of writing. Eight short plays were chosen for performance. Along with writers, new directors were also given a chance to try out their skills. It was an ambitious project to coordinate, but provided a rich and entertaining run in May 2023. Styles ranged from the Pinteresque to family drama and farce, with subjects covering regrets about the past, the desire for personal freedom, how learning to dance can change your life and the misunderstanding of basic language!

Now the writers had got the bug, but what to do next? The group decided to continue the Victorian tradition of gathering together on winter evenings to tell spooky stories. The latest venture was a one-off evening of *Ghostly Tales* which took place on 2 December to fundraise for Mornington Hall. Each story was different: the ghosts were good spirits, or vengeful or funny, but there were threads of connections running throughout: some of the writers had revisited aspects of their pieces in *Creative Streak*. These new stories embraced melodrama, romance and comedy in a monologue about a mother, a tale of a Caribbean jumbee (a mythological spirit or demon) or a friendship tested to the limits during a dare. The evening was experimental; the pieces were read aloud from scripts, the first rehearsed reading the group had done.

Talking to some of the writers at a recent meeting, it's clear the opportunity to provide new material for the company was greatly valued, and enabled them to explore and develop their creative abilities beyond acting. One writer felt it helped deepen her skills as a performer, as she's interested in all aspects of theatre: acting, writing and directing. Another added that members could experiment with their plays, and others agreed that the group's strength was its diverse writing in different genres.

In the last few years, CADOS has expanded its membership. The addition of an in-house writing group, with the ability to commission and produce original work can only help it grow further. To misquote an old saying, at CADOS, we think everyone has a play in them!

100 Years Oldand still going strong



This year marks a monumental new chapter for Ruislip Operatic Society (ROS) as they mark their 100th anniversary. Founded the same year as the likes of Disney, Time Magazine and Warner Brothers, the idea for a musical society in Ruislip was proposed at a public meeting on 17th December 1923. After much discussion, the Society was born.

The founding members soon began building the structure of the group - building up their collective repertoire and enlisting volunteers to join their growing list of members laying the foundations for what it would eventually become.

April 1925 marked a momentous occasion, as the society made its first ever public performance with a concert version of Merrie England. The handbills advertising the show stated that the Society "had spared no pains to do justice to the Opera and hopes it will be the first of many successes."

In 1939, despite the outbreak of World War 2, ROS made the

decision to carry on. With the exception of 2020/21 due to the pandemic, ROS are proud to have put together at least one production per year since 1925 - producing over 130 live theatrical experiences including musicals, operas, plays and concerts to date.

Flash forward to the swinging sixties and ROS had firmly cemented their place amongst the heart of the local community. In 1965, ROS performed at the Winston Churchill Theatre's inaugural launch plus produced the first full show at the venue. This remains the home of Ruislip Operatic Society to this day.

At the start of the new millennium ROS founded ROS Stageworks - a weekly theatre workshop for children aged 6 to 18. Led by Annie Hertler Smith with a talented team of volunteers *(largely composed of ROS members),* the programme was designed to introduce local kids to the world of musical theatre in an inspiring and educational way, helping students to reach their fullest potential and develop their skills. ROS Stageworks Summer School, an annual week-long musical theatre experience for young people, was also launched a few years later.

Alongside talented performers, ROS members are involved in all areas of live theatre including set design/construction - led by Vice President Alan Bailey and his Alphabet Gang. One of the most memorable was the design for Blitz! In 2010. This involved constructing a wall that could be blown up every night and reconstructed for the next evening's performance. The set won the Shinfield Players Scenery award that year.

ROS is proud to have won NODA awards for scenery, programme and poster design and chorus work showing they are an all-round society.

The group kicked off 2023 with their highly anticipated production of Gershwin's award winning show Crazy For You. Continuing the celebratory spirit, ROS held their Centenary Anniversary Dinner Dance in July, welcoming over 100 guests including members past and present, NODA representatives and more. NODA Regional Councillor, Pam Armstrong commented out *"My heartfelt congratulations to ROS on achieving such a notable milestone. It was such a pleasure for me to celebrate with ROS your 100th Anniversary and the manner in which you made me feel part of you, by the welcoming warmth of your greeting was so much appreciated."*

The beginning of September marked an exciting new chapter with the launch of ROS's brand new website - www.rosboxoffice.co.uk. This coincided with the release of their limited edition 100 Year merchandise.

Closing the year in spectacular style, Ruislip Operatic Society's next production will be the spectacular White Christmas the Musical, performing at the Winston Churchill Theatre from 29th November to 2nd

December 2023. This includes one BSL performance, helping to make the magic of live theatre even more accessible to all.

There are thousands of incredibly talented individuals who have worked with Ruislip Operatic Society across the years, many of whom have had a lasting effect on the group. There are certainly far too many people to list individually. As we reflect on the past, we look forward to ROS's future - continuing to entertain audiences for many more years to come.

Congratulations on reaching the grand age of 100 and providing your audiences with superb entertainment over the years. Ed.

Making Betty

My offer to make the puppet of Betty the pig for (CADOS) Chingford Amateur Dramatic and Operatic Society's 2023 production of Betty Blue Eyes, was a much bigger task than I had initially imagined. I had a clear image of what I wanted to create. I am commercial artist and I have always loved making things. I spoke to our artistic director Judith Jackson and she was open to me having a bash at making a Betty puppet. She gave me four requirements. The controls for the puppet had to be recessed within the body of the puppet, nothing sticking out. It had to be strong enough to take the punishment of regular performances. The puppet had to be able to sit up on its own, and finally it needed to be "big". All versions of the pig seemed to be on the small side, considering that according to the script it had to feed 150 people. I resolved to make a full-size adult pig.

I made Betty from cardboard, PVA / papier-mâché and doweling. Roughing out her initial shape with cardboard boxes, I realised Waltham Forest municipal recycling bins were the perfect template for her basic shape. During her construction I took Betty to rehearsals, working with Nicole Constantinou the puppeteer to develop how the puppet worked. Being made from paper and cardboard Betty is light enough to be controlled by a single operator. Her physical size became truly apparent when I attached her legs for the first time, prompting the nickname 'pigzilla'. Her legs are articulated, she can kneel curtsy and, sitting on her rump with her front legs locked out, she can sit upright. Betty's ears are on springs which allows them to have a pleasing bounce when she is moving.

The biggest challenges making Betty was her size and the effect that had on drying time for PVA papiermâché. Betty is now part of the CADOS props archive in case anyone needs her again.
