### PRIDE OF READING AWARD FOR STARMAKER FOUNDER

## LONDON GROUP WIN NODA NATIONAL POSTER COMPETITION



A man who helped Titanic star Kate Winslet make her acting debut has scooped an 'Oscar' for himself by winning the Pride of Reading award for Commitment to the Community. Since founding Starmaker Theatre Company 25 years ago, David Savage, has helped hundreds of budding actors and actresses take their first steps on to the stage. Mr Savage – who has been busy with three huge musical productions this year to celebrate Starmaker's 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary said he is enjoying Starmaker as much today as he did 25 years ago. The anonymous nomination described Mr Savage as 'a truly inspiring part of Reading's art community, his enthusiasm and dedication to Reading's young talent is remarkable and he deserves a huge pat on the back for his years of hard work'.

More than 350 attended Starmaker's glittering 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary party at Reading Town Hall in May, including Nathan James from ITV's Superstar and several West End performers. "I'm very proud of the quality of the productions which I believe is still as high as it was 25 years ago and the kids feel they are part of something very special when they do it." said Mr Savage. On receiving the award from Chris Tarrant and Jun Okumura, he said "It's

amazing, it's very humbling to have this award and it's very, very nice to receive the applause. Starmaker has been going for 25 years and I'll keep on going until I get too old".

Jun Okumura, managing director of sponsor Kyocera said, "I am pleased to hear he has worked for 25 years because that is exactly the same period as we have been here. It is amazing that he has been contributing to the arts in Reading for so long. It is fantastic."

To celebrate Starmaker's 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary, Dave Savage is directing three recently released musicals, Les Miserables, Cats and Miss Saigon (Schools Editions). Les Miserables was presented in March 2013, Cats in October 2013 and finally Miss Saigon will be presented in March 2014, an enormous challenge but one which Dave Savage will take in his stride. All of the productions are presented at the Wilde Theatre in Bracknell, the first two being sell-outs.

Jacquie Stedman accepted the trophy on their behalf at the conference in Peebles in September with the District 14 Rep, Gordon Bird making the official presentation to the group and their President, Johnny Ball, later.

### YOUNGER GENERATION RECEIVE THEIR AWARD

### THE LITTLE THEATRE BY THE PARK, CHESHAM



Celebrating their 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary, the Chesham Bois Catholic Players felt it would be a suitable time to promote their wonderful little theatre. This was the culmination of a dream that started in 1983 with the acquisition of a lease for the Temperance Hall which at the time was standing empty.

With some insight and very clever planning, Mike O'Toole and his fellow trustees set about turning an empty and lonely building into a little treasure. Over the years much has been done to enhance the space. From the outside it appears to be an ordinary structure, but once through the entrance it is like

stepping into the Tardis. This is

something the general public do not see and I was privileged to be taken on a tour. Usually the main hall is filled with tables and chairs for a performance and is a supper theatre which adds to the atmosphere and makes for a cosy environment.

What the audience do not see is the amazing planning that went into creating the space into a quite extraordinary venue. By adding a first floor utilising the very high ceiling of the original structure, a large work area has been created filled with paints, canvases and everything else needed for set building, plus a very large costume area which must be the envy of many groups around.





There is a delightful dressing room complete with washbasins and lighted mirrors, toilet and kitchen facilities for the cast and of course the necessary green room. The inspiration for this and the hard work over the years, which has included knocking down walls, building extra space including storage downstairs for the tables and chairs, is such a revelation one wonders how it all came about.

It is down to enthusiasm, inspiration, blood sweat and tears on the part of so many of the members. Clever innovations have been incorporated such as the lighting deck and sound system which fold down and shut into cupboards and can be assembled and up and running in about 15 minutes.





The foyer seems ordinary, until down from the wall comes a table and padded seat to form the box office - what a surprise! There are very few groups fortunate enough to have their own theatre belonging to them and still less to have planned and built it from scratch. Every credit must go to Chesham Bois Catholic Players who I am sure are very proud of their achievement.


## PUTNEY LIGHT OPERATIC SOCIETY CELEBRATE 65 YEARS

This year Putney Light Operatic Society has been celebrating its 65th anniversary. Founded by music teacher George Kimm in 1948 as a class in Light Opera at the Putney Literary Institute. PLOS initially established itself with large cast productions of mainly Gilbert and Sullivan operettas. Widely acclaimed in the local press (despite a constant lack of male members) these early productions were sumptuous in set and costumes if rather static in terms of choreography. But by the mid to late 1960s the influence of highly popular musical films and rising standards in the West End and on Broadway had a direct impact on amateur shows and PLOS, like so many other societies, had to learn to embrace audiences' increased expectations. The role of Director overtook the previous pre-eminence of the Musical Director and choreographers and specialist dancers became a standard feature. Show choices also changed, with operetta giving way to both British and American musicals and in 1977 the appearance of the first, now legendary, PLOS pantomime. To date, PLOS has performed numerous operettas, musicals and pantomimes to thousands of audience members in the Putney and Wandsworth area.

PLOS's 65th anniversary production was The Witches of Eastwick, which the Society performed in May at their regular venue, Putney Arts Theatre. A highly ambitious choice for such a technically limiting venue, the sell-out show was a huge success both commercially and critically. An assistant director for the original West End production, who came to see PLOS's version, later told the Director that he thought the show had captured perfectly the essence and magic of the story as well as achieving very high level production values. The cast certainly enjoyed themselves, with one of the longest cast parties in PLOS history stretching into a second day of celebrations! Indeed, regular Witches cast and crew reunions are still taking place in and around the Putney area! In July, PLOS staged an Anniversary Gala Dinner in the upstairs function room of the Star and Garter on Putney riverside. With video recorded messages and special guest appearances by members from across the years, the evening was a wonderful celebration of everything PLOS has achieved and stands for today. Six new Life Members were announced and a special auction raised some much needed

funds. In addition to concert appearances and their regular participation in the turning on of the Putney Christmas lights, PLOS will end their anniversary year in traditional style with their annual family pantomime.

This year's choice of Cinderella could not be more appropriate. Born in postwar austerity and confronted with countless difficulties though out the years such as



lack of funds, performance venue and rehearsal premises, PLOS has always risen to and beaten every challenge thrown in its way. Aided by a good few 'fairy godmothers', PLOS has consistently dared to dream the impossible and make it a reality. Like Cinders, if you're a PLOS Member, you'll have a ball!

# NODA SCENIC AWARD Changes to Judging

Those of you who have attended the NODA London Annual Conference in the past will know that each year we have the Shinfield Players Scenic Award for groups who build their own sets. In this economic climate this saves societies a lot of money as well as giving them the freedom to design and construct a set which works better for them, in their particular venue, than a hired set from a scenic supplier. In London we have always encouraged this thinking and so, for 2014, we are putting in place a new way of judging this award, rather than having it as part of the 'general' judging which all takes place on the same day.

I have approached Alastair Woodgate from Green Room Productions, who do, in fact, build their own sets, to chair the new panel which will consist of at least two other people who understand the concept and design, as well as all the hard work, which goes into set building. They are the people who will be required to look at the submissions (and I anticipate that this will take a complete day) and judge them truly on their merits. We feel that this will be a more comprehensive method for reaching a fairer decision, and I hope that you will feel the same.

Therefore, I would ask that, when thinking about how you are going to set about constructing your own set, you do some concept drawings and plans, and then take photographs of the set construction in progress, as well as the finished article (without any actors on the stage please), thus giving the panel as much information as possible to help them make their decisions. It is, of course, dependent on the Regional Rep, who sees the shows, nominating your group, and only they can make that decision. However, if your group is nominated, at least the panel have a much better understanding of the project.
