

For Riverside Players she has also directed musicals, plays and pantomimes and been active in all other back room jobs, Stage Manager, Box Office and FOH to name but a few, as well as Chair for five years.

Susan has performed in many musicals with local groups, though these days mainly supporting in off-stage activities.

Also a child of the 60's, Terry's interest in the theatre could be said to go back as far as Sunday School, when he was asked to find an interesting way of telling the story of The Good Samaritan. The following week he turned up with a model box of a theatre, along with working house tabs, battery operated Lego lights, a script and several scene changes! He was about 8 years old! Since then, he's moved on to real theatres!

Starting out with various youth theatre and dance groups, on leaving school he continued to keep up his performing interests with amateur groups, but worked backstage in professional theatre for about seven years. He says "I feel very fortunate to have had the opportunity to learn from some fabulous 'old school' professionals, covering lighting, sound, stage management, set design and scenic art, TIE (Theatre in Education) and even worked periodically in TV/film, but I have found my niche as a scenic artist."

Following a change in career, in 1997 he joined BACCES (British Airways Cabin Crew Entertainment Society) and returned to amateur theatre. Over the past 20 years he has been heavily involved with the staging of most BACCES productions, having written 10 scripts, designed and painted scenery, liaised with lighting sound designers and the musical director, and been Assistant Director.

YOUNG PEOPLE SHOULD BE SEEN AND NOT HEARD – NOT ANYMORE!



All of my recent thoughts and discussions have coincided with Phil Barnett being appointed to the NODA Council with responsibility for Youth Development. Phil recently called a meeting of all Youth Advisors and this proved to be a most stimulating and productive day. We discussed not only the changing face of NODA generally - and many changes are afoot - but we also developed a youth strategy and a five year plan. Obviously not everything can happen at once but the time is now right for us to give more visibility to our youth.

My name is Ann Hertler-Smith and I have been the NODA London Youth Advisor for 8 years now. What is my role? Well it is my responsibility to provide information, help and encouragement in whatever way required to our groups which either have a need for young performers for their shows, which have a youth group running alongside their adult group or which are completely independent youth groups. I have 13 years of experience of running a youth group as well as many years in musical theatre as a performer and director/choreographer.

So, why am I writing this article? I am currently aware of only 19 societies with youth groups or independent youth groups. Across our region we have over 200 societies so it seems we have a very small percentage of recognised youth groups. In addition not all of these youth groups invite their regional representative or myself to see their shows. It is worth mentioning here that the only way a youth group can qualify for nomination of our Youngstars Award or any of our other awards is for the representative to have seen and reviewed a show. This also means that the wealth of young talent, that I am convinced is in our region, and which has to be the life blood of the future of our wonderful hobby, may been seen by their local audiences but are not being recognised and encouraged within NODA London.

It is my firm belief that if our hobby is to survive we all have to embrace new ideas in the way societies are run, the shows which are performed and we must recognise that young people need to be encouraged and give a much higher profile than of late. I have been speaking to our Councillor Jacquie Stedman recently about how we can promote youth by investing time and, yes, money into a stronger platform for recognising our young performers and also helping societies to capitalise on the opportunities we have now with so many new and exciting shows becoming available for amateurs to perform. Young people are far more likely to be interested in joining in a production of a show they have heard of rather some of our, now, very old shows. 


ROS Stageworks

- establish a youth presence on the NODA website including a specific 'youth brand'
- encourage social media tools as a means of communications to embrace youth
- identify more existing youth groups within the London region
- encourage more youth groups to join NODA
- work with other Youth Advisors to support youth groups nationally with non-creative activities such as marketing, PR etc.
- identify training needs offer day, weekend workshops and a national Youth Academy
- promote new shows especially suitable for youth groups.
- help societies to embrace young performers and remove the perceived fear of bureaucracy around licensing and DBS etc





A Word About P R O J E C T I O N !

Finally, a word about projection. One of the most difficult things an actor, amateur or professional, has to make sure their dialogue must be spoken clearly and with the understanding that whatever is said must be heard by the audience sitting at the back of the auditorium. It is no use depending upon a sound engineer, if one has a personal mic., to increase the volume if the speaker delivers their dialogue on stage too quietly, as, in that case, turning up the sound would cause distortion. Any director of a show, be it a play or a musical, knows the dialogue so well that unless they sit at the back of the theatre, or in the circle (if there is one) during a dress rehearsal, they have no idea whether the dialogue on stage can be heard by the audience sitting in those seats.

Even in a small venue, a church or a school hall, words spoken on stage must be projected. In other words delivery should be spoken louder than one would use in everyday conversation. Always make certain you are facing towards the audience when speaking, if that is not possible and you have to turn your back to the audience, increase the volume. Even in a two way conversation on stage, your face should be angled so that your speech can be heard throughout the theatre without relying upon the 'sound man'.


