

Financial Performance

There was further growth in activity across nearly all areas, resulting in a significant increase in total income for the year. Costs rose correspondingly in line with this increased activity and, although they were effectively managed, a small deficit was recorded. Our investment portfolio performed well despite challenging market conditions, once again showing a small gain in value. As NODA's 125th year draws to a close, I'm pleased to present this summary of key activity across what has been a very busy and productive twelve months.

Recognition

My sincere thanks go to our dedicated volunteers and the head office team, led by COO Dale Freeman, for their tireless work. Their professionalism and passion continue to drive the organisation forward.

Importantly much appreciation to you our members- your passion for theatre is the reason we exist and an inspiration to us all

Achievements

The launch of our new branding has been a major highlight. Widely welcomed, it reflects a modern, forward-thinking NODA and supports our goal of appealing to a broader membership, with added focus on youth.

The vibrant new identity is now in place across our website, literature, certificates, trophies and social media—creating a clear and consistent face to take us into the next decade and beyond.

Events

Members continue to embrace opportunities to celebrate achievements, awards and milestones at regional events and AGMs across all 11 regions, with evergrowing attendance. The NODA National AGM and Conference in 2024, was held in Plymouth.

Collaborations

We celebrated the 25th anniversary of our strategic partnership with Lloyd & Whyte, who, for the benefit of members, deliver a wide range of quality insurance solutions specifically designed for the theatrical and operatic communities.

ProArts+ continues to meet an ever growing demand from members by providing legal advice, expert guidance and strategic support.

We are also actively exploring a potential new patronage.

While membership decline has slowed, we are now beginning to see signs of growth—particularly as benefits such as discounted insurance and DBS access are more widely promoted.

The introduction of Band F has supported income, and careful financial management has given us a stable position.

Education

NODA Summer School continues to thrive, attracting both new and returning students. Conferences and online resources further support learning, networking and best practice sharing.

Communication

NODA Today remains a key

communication tool, in both print and digital formats.

New contributors, including consultant and former CEO Mark Pemberton OBE, are helping raise NODA's voice at national level, importantly, with a process of engagement through government channels.

Website

Our newly launched website provides enhanced support to members, including legal guidance, publicity tools and pantomime scripts.

It recorded 306,000 visits in 2024 (vs. 223,260 in 2023), representing a 37% increase, reflecting improved member engagement.

Awards

We issued 1,309 long service awards, including 161 youth awards.

All awards are now administered through the CIO, with the exception of insurance commissions, which have seen significant growth.

Future plans

2024, saw the implementation of major governance improvements: A new Constitution and Byelaws, Standardised Terms of Reference and improved compliance monitoring.

New policies will be introduced to ensure consistency across activities, especially around budgeting.

In closing

As I prepare to step down as chairman, I find myself reflecting not only on this past year, but also on the privilege of serving in this role. To have led NODA through its 125th anniversary has been an honour beyond words, and I leave

with immense pride in what we have achieved together: a stronger organisation, a refreshed identity and a renewed confidence in the future.

My own journey in amateur theatre began back in 1963, as a founder member of a local society. To be awarded Life Membership at last year's AGM was both humbling and deeply meaningful—a reminder of the friendships, shared values and lasting impact that amateur theatre has across our communities.

I have been fortunate to witness first hand the passion, commitment and resilience that define NODA and its members. Most of all, I am grateful for the friendships formed, the dedication shown and the shared love of theatre that means so much to us all.

As I hand over to my successor, I do so with confidence in NODA's future and with heartfelt thanks to everyone for their contribution to all we have achieved together. I offer my successor, and the board, my very best wishes for every success and fulfilment as they lead NODA into its next chapter, knowing they will be warmly supported by our dedicated volunteers, members and staff. I look forward to continuing contributing and supporting the NODA family in the years ahead.
