NDFA Representative

NODA has a new representative on the Council of the National Drama Festivals Association (Bronwen Stanway). Bronwen, a past Secretary

of NDFA, will attend Council meetings and the AGM to represent NODA members and keep up to date with the world of Festivals.

NDFA is an Association of more than 37 independent Drama Festivals drawn from across the UK running full length, one act and youth Festivals. NDFA was formed to support amateur theatre in all its forms but in particular in the organisation of drama festivals and also sponsors a Playwriting Competition to encourage new writing.

Each year NDFA organises the British All Winners Drama Festival - a week long celebration of the best in dramatic theatre. In 2016 the Festival will take place in Hertford from the 25 to 31 July.

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Tony Gibbs Leaves NODA

After eight and a half years in the post Tony Gibbs has left his role as the National Operatic and Dramatic Association's Chief Executive Officer.

In a statement issued in January NODA's Chairman of Trustees, Fred Piggford said, "It has been agreed by mutual consent that Tony Gibbs is leaving his role as Chief Executive of NODA, as well as Company Secretary of our trading company, NODA Ltd., with immediate effect, as part of a restructure to which he had contributed various proposals and options, with the best long-term interests of NODA at heart."

Gibbs has worked for NODA since July 2007 and, over the years, has played a significant role in helping to modernise the organisation, as well as bringing a more strategic approach to business planning and the development of the association's membership services.

"He has personally shown consistent support for the trustees of the organisation," said Piggford, "and provided 'hands-on' operational management including input into marketing, publishing and the use of social media. He has also acted as a first class ambassador for NODA at all times."

Gibbs leaves NODA having been instrumental in creating various new initiatives during his term as CEO. These included introducing and delivering 'The Business of Amateur Theatre' workshop, recognising the importance for society

Readers will remember our previous issue covered another new initiative inspired by Gibbs last Summer on the Isle of Man. Theatrefest was a new five-year plan in partnership with the IOMArt Council and focused on new writing. Sardines is unaware, at this stage, whether Gibbs' departure will affect the future of Theatrefest but, rest assured, we will bring you news as soon as it becomes available, as well as NODA's future strategies which will no doubt include finding a possible replacement for Gibbs.

In conclusion Fred Piggford said: "We thank him for his many contributions and wish him every success in his future endeavours."





The show must go on...

Two popular writers may have thought their pantomime career was behind them – but oh no it wasn't!

After a break of six years, Toby Bradford and Tina Webster have now produced their 11th panto script, Rapunzel.

They had written their tenth panto, The Pantomime Adventures Of Sinbad, back in 2009. The show was first performed at Derby Guildhall Theatre by Kaleidoscope Players, as the previous nine had been, with Tina directing and Toby on stage.

Toby said: "After ten, we decided to take a break. I wanted to try my hand at other things. So far, I've written a couple of plays and I'm still working on a musical and a novel. I've also done a bit of writing for TV.

"When Tina suggested doing a new panto, I wasn't entirely convinced, I thought I'd moved on but, as soon as I sat down to think about it, the ideas started sparking and we were away.

"The great thing about pantomime is you can set your imagination free. There are no rules. OK, there are some rules – like the baddie never wins – but, outside of that, anything can happen." Tina added: "We were ready for a break after Sinbad. Then I went to live in America for two years and, when I got back, I felt like doing something creative again. I needed something to get my teeth into after doing very little in the US. Also, it's something my late Mum was proud of, so I need to continue with it.

"It's not an easy process, but I think we work well together. Our individual skills work well as a partnership, Toby is a good story-teller, and I am good at visualising how it will work on stage. We trust each other's judgement enough to alter each other's work without feeling that we may offend or be offended."

Rapunzel was published in December by the National Operatic and Dramatic Association (NODA). The organisation has also published the ten other Bradford and Webster pantomimes and they are performed by amateur theatre companies across the UK – and further afield.

Toby said: "There are about 20-or-so productions a year of the various shows. The most popular seem to be Treasure Island and Aladdin. And there have been productions in France, Italy – and Canada!

"We decided to write Rapunzel – and we both seemed to have agreed that's what we were going to write before we'd even discussed it – because we wanted another classic, well-known tale but something that was not the usual pantomime fare.

"I looked back at the Brothers Grimm version of the story and quickly realised there's a lot of it that's perhaps not suitable for panto, such as the prince being blinded violently and Rapunzel spending quite some time as a homeless teenage single mother of twins."

Tina said: "So we've taken the basic story of a girl with amazing hair who is locked in a tower without stairs or a door and woven a magical tale around that.

"Also, the film Tangled has been a very successful choice for Disney, so the story obviously works well for today's generation of children."

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As a result we have come up with a five year plan which aims to tackle our youth membership head on and keep hold of them for as long as possible. Thereby safeguarding firstly theatre making and secondly theatre venues throughout the UK at a time when budgets are tightening and the public purse shrinking.

This plan is broken down into three sections. For the sake of argument (and to keep you engaged) lets call these "Act 1", "The Interval" and "Act 2."

So Act 1 (our short term aims) here we go. Let's lay out the exposition and introduce you to some of the leading characters...

Firstly we need to establish a youth presence on the NODA website. Current thought in terms of layout and format is to use the template that we have for the regions but adopt a style that appeals to younger members establishing links with Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and other social media to ensure regular updates.

This will be supplemented by regional weekend workshops and a Youth Theatre Academy using the Disney Workshops and the NODA Summer School as models.

For those mad fools out there who want to establish their own youth theatre we will provide comprehensive online guides showing you how to succeed in business without really trying! In addition to this we will offer support to all youth advisers in the hope that they will offer training sessions within their own regions.

So now all that's clear it's time to break out the ice cream and gin and tonics! It's the interval (our mid-term aims). At this point we hope to establish a presence for youth at both regional and national levels by ensuring that all events of this scale are attended by the Councillor for Youth

or a Youth advisor to personally respond to all enquires. In addition to this we would hope that these representatives would also be given the platform to present updates on Youth Strategy.

It's also at this midpoint that we will step up a drive for youth membership. This is not just about recruiting new members but keeping the ones we have by identifying those groups within NODA that should be classified as youth theatre and providing them with tailormade support through their local Youth Adviser. We will also aim to identify youth theatre organisations that are not part of NODA and speak to them about the benefits of NODA membership.

Finally Act 2 (our long term aims). We begin the build to the grand finale. Standby with glitter ball and sequins... we will centralise support for these youth groups in all aspects of theatre that are non-creative; offering poster and programme templates as well as templates for all aspects of media strategy (both print and viral).

We will specialise the training given to Youth Advisers to enable them to provide a more comprehensive coverage to their regions depending on local requirements.

Finally (and here's where we go all out – think pyrotechnics) we hope to be able to create a brand with NODA specifically for youth. Ensuring that these aroups are cared for and responded to correctly within the overall umbrella of NODA's national portfolio.

Of course none of this will be possible without your continued support, help and guidance. So we will be seeking your feedback on this throughout its development. 🛨

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

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

NODA Today interviews Gabriella Williams, who plays Sophie in Mamma Mia about her roots in amateur theatre

Gabriella started her showbiz career with the Retford Operatic Society and the Mini Operatic Bunch (MOB) at Retford, Nottinghamshire. After training at Tring Park School for Performing Arts (A levels in the morning, musical theatre in the afternoon!) she studied for a degree in Musical Theatre at The Arts Educational Schools in London. Towards the end of her course she was given the part of Chris in the award-winning 'Carrie' at Southwark Playhouse and only a week later Gabriella started her current job, playing Sophie in the West End production of Mamma Mia, which she has done since June 2015.



The first big role I played was Tallulah in 'Bugsy Malone' in 2006 with The MOB at the Retford Little Theatre.

When did you realise that you really enjoyed being on stage?

My family have always participated in musicals - my Mum loves to act and my Nan loves to dance and even my Dad got involved in the backstage work. I don't remember a time I haven't been rehearsing for a show, it was my hobby throughout my youth. At 16 I took the leap to train professionally and now at 22 it's my full time job! I'm very lucky to have always known what I wanted to do, to have had a passion.

As an amateur what was your favourite show...and role? I met all of my closest friends through

and every show I did with them was an absolute ball. If I were to choose one it would have been 'Les Miserables' in 2008 at The Retford Majestic Theatre with the MOB. I played the role of Cosette and all of the other roles were played by my very closest friends. My final role with the MOB was Belle in 'Beauty and the Beast' - I don't think any girl could say they didn't long to be a Disney Princess.

When did you decide that you wanted to perform

professionally?

Seeing 'Wicked' in the West End for the first time at the age of 11. I looked up and saw a beautiful, blonde woman floating down from the stage in a bubble, singing and smiling - I was captivated. That is her JOB. Her JOB! She's being paid to have all of that fun! I knew I had to at least try.

Memorable moment?

from age 8-16 - I did countless Musicals, Pantomimes and Concerts with them. Last month 69 MOBsters got on a coach to see me in the West End playing Sophie in 'Mamma Mia'. When the curtain goes up to begin the show I sit alone ready to sing "I have a dream"...when the curtain went up this time there was a roar from the audience that I will never forget. Lovely support.

Any theatre superstitions?

I am the most horrendously superstitious person. When you're doing the exact same show 8 times a week you fall into a very precise routine backstage. I have to leave my dressing room to specific lyrics and have particular parts of the set I need to touch before going on stage ridiculous!

What advice would you give a young person who would like a career in the performing arts?

★ Only do it if you cannot not do it. ★ If you cannot not do it, PLEASE between criticising yourself and working hard - let yourself enjoy it! ★ Don't try and be anything that you're

Each company has the opportunity to perform, with the professionals, in their own Region and then at the Royal Shakespeare Company's Theatre in Stratford-upon-Avon. They are also working with local schoolchildren who form Titania's fairy train, and for whom an experience like this will remain with them forever.

It has had very favourable reviews in the national press and once all the local performances have been done each group will perform in Stratford. I am sure it has also been a tremendous undertaking for the professional cast, as each cast of Mechanicals will provide a different set of dynamics to which they will have to adapt.

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MEET THE NEW MEMBERS OF THE LONDON TEAM

The NODA London region is seeking to significantly boost its social media presence by recruiting a volunteer to solely look after social media and e-communications. Nick Ford has taken on the role and is starting by reinvigorating the NODA London Twitter account. Attention will then also turn to Facebook, where we already have good presence. The over-riding aim is to make the NODA London Twitter feed and Facebook page the place to go for all NODA London societies to find out what is on across the whole of London. But at the same time, Nick has been writing articles to help all NODA London societies improve their social media presence - which is becoming increasingly important in order to sell tickets and to attract new members. We have found that around 75% of NODA London societies are on Twitter and most of the remainder are on Facebook instead, but the aim is to make sure that each society takes advantage of this great (and free!) medium of publicity.

run traditional theatre with its own premises and an active programme of in-house theatrical productions and visiting shows. The theatre is in a healthy financial position, relying on a core of season ticket holders and sales of seats for productions (as well as hiring out the theatre, scenery cloths and properties).

As the theatre relies on its income for all its running and development needs, the society is keenly interested in the audiences it attracts for productions, and in putting on a programme of events that will sustain the theatre in a state of rude health.

The success of Tynemouth Priory Theatre has not been accidental. It is based on a deeper understanding of the customer base (both existing and potential). Qualitative and quantitative market research has been carried out on a regular basis in this recent development with income and profits rising significantly as well as occupancy numbers with the average age of audience members falling and a larger catchment area

The vision for the theatre was to strike the best balance between commercial and artistic

Tynemouth Priory Theatre is a privately success with member/volunteer fulfilment. From that vision sprang a number of tactical developments which include a more customer/ audience focus, developing and concentrating on the theatre's obvious niche, skilled production choice (a well-balanced programme of productions), an emphasis on high quality productions, a new and improved website and on-line booking facilities, partnership working with other symbiotic local business (for example a meal-deal with a local restaurant), enhanced facilities and services on site (refurbished audience areas and refreshments in the interval), value-for-money ticket prices, reasonable refreshment charges and superior marketing including mailing lists and regular feedback to the management committee.

The Theatre looks forward to a successful future based on its management approach, visionary thinking and the ability of its membership to adapt and act in its best interest (for example the current up-dating of the website). The flexible, audienceorientated strategy is strongly entrenched in the theatre's approach and it is prepared to adapt and adjust to meet future audience demands so it can be enjoyed and be an enjoyable show-business organisation. If Tynemouth Priory Theatre has anything to do with it, the show will go on.

Hawes Lights out

It was mentioned in the last magazine that the lights had failed briefly during an open air performance in the North and the audience lit the stage with mobile phone lights. Well Hawes OS went one better during their pantomime, The Wind in the Willows, in December when the whole of the venues electricity failed just before curtain up amidst gale force winds and lashing rain outside. No music from the electronic keyboard, no stage lighting, no lighting in the hall. In true Blitz spirit the society decided to battle on with their last night performance. The prompter, with torch, was pressed into becoming a 'moving spotlight' with Santa giving out presents to the children at the end in torchlight. The audience seemed to appreciate keeping going and the 'show must go on' attitude and all went home happy (if somewhat tossed and wet from the inclement weather). ★

Ian Bows Out

Ian Wells first trod the boards as a child in a pageant in Burntisland, Fife, the town where he grew up. Having moved to Tyneside in 1951, he appeared as a Herald in an open-air production of 'Merrie England' with the Hebburn Operatic Society in 1953 to mark the **Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.**


His first big role was that of 'The Stage Manager' in the play 'Our Town', by Thornton Wilder, mounted by Gateshead Grammar School in 1952, and then 'Mr Darcy' in 'Pride and Prejudice' the following year.

From then on he appeared with many groups in the area including University Rag Week shows and he remarks that he closed at least three theatres in Newcastle, The Palace Theatre, the Flora Robson Playhouse, and the Moss Empire, when 'Rag Revue' moved to successive houses as another closed. He appeared with Jarrow AO&DS and in 1962 joined Felling & District AO&DS for its production of 'Brigadoon' where he met his wife, Hazel. They became founder members of the Caprian AO&DS in 1965, and from then on lan appeared with, and directed for, many societies including South Shields G&S, Durham AOS, Tynemouth AOS, Newcastle AO&DS, West End OS, as well as Felling, until 2013 when he retired from being active in amateur theatre, having been involved in nearly 200 shows. His favourite roles included Henry Higgins, Nathan Detroit, J Pierrepoint Finch, and Henry Machin.

He put his name forward for election as a NODA Northern Area Regional Representative in 1989 when the incumbent, Rene Dearden, passed away, but was unsuccessful. In 1991, however, he was approached by Harry Low, the Northern Area Councillor, with a view to succeeding him. Ian agreed to let his name go forward and was duly elected Northern Area Councillor and installed as such at the NODA Annual Conference in Bournemouth in September 1991.

Two years later he was appointed Chairman of the Committee of the NODA Drama Summer School which

was held at Churchill Hall, University of Bristol, and served in that capacity until 1997. This was one of the three Summer Schools held under the auspices of NODA at the time, the other two being the Operatic School at Ripon, and the Technical at Winchester, Discussions had been taking place in Council about combining the three schools into one which seemed a logical step and would be more economical to fund. The decision was made to go ahead with this plan and Ian was appointed Chairman of the NODA Summer School. After much research by him and Treasurer Reg Vinnicombe, a recommendation that it be held at Warwick University was accepted by Council, and the inaugural combined Summer School was held from 8th – 15th August 1998, with Kate Neilson as Director. The courses on offer, some for the first time,



were Choreography, Drama Directors, Drama Performers, Make-up, Musical Performance, Musical Theatre Directors, Musical Directors, Opera Performance, Stage Lighting, Stage Management, and Wardrobe. Ian continued to serve as Chairman until 2010, when he retired from Council.

Ian was elected Vice-President of the Association in 1998, and succeeded to the Presidency in 1999. He was elected a Life Member of the Association in 2000, and continued to serve on Council until his retirement in 2010. After his year as President he continued to serve on the Area/ Regional Committee as Editor and then Membership Secretary until his retirement in 2016, having served NODA in various capacities for twentyfive years. 🛨



She said: "I am so pleased that our reps in the North West recognise the importance of awards nights to celebrate the achievements of local performers.

"To have so many NODA members coming together at these nights is a real joy for all of us involved.

"Our North West awards sell out every year, so these nights in the districts are an extra way to mark our achievements and allow for so many more people to engage with NODA as an organisation.

"My heartfelt congratulations goes out to each of the reps who host local awards, and to all of their winners many of whom will also make the trip to join us in Manchester for the North West events, where we enjoy both youth and adult awards on two separate nights."



'It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief...' this opening line of Dickens' novel, A Tale of Two Cities, couldn't be more apt for the rollercoaster ride Rochdale Musical Theatre Company experienced when staging the epic musical based on this classic tale. Rochdale Musical Theatre Company took the bold decision to stage the North West premiere of the Broadway musical, A Tale of Two Cities by Jill Santoriello in 2014 with the aim of performing it in February 2015. The Company deferred the performance to February 2016 when they were proud to present Peter Norris as the drunk cynic Sydney Carton and Phil Swift as the French Aristocrat Charles Darnay. The show demands both of these characters to have outstanding singing voices and to look alike because they swap places at the end of the show, one man sacrificing his life for the other, for his love of Lucie Manette.

The committee were drawn to this show by the stirring music and Dickens' story of love, vengeance and valour, all set during the French Revolution. Rochdale Musical Theatre Company has a large chorus and the committee felt that they would be able to do this blockbuster justice. The Company has received fantastic reviews which have praised their efforts in staging this epic production. Audience members have commented on the high standard of the singing (taught by Musical Director Richard Lord) and the effective acting and company movement (directed by Howard Raw). The stage crew (led by Stage Manager Paul Shiel) played a huge part in the success of the show as they ably manoeuvred the house frame structures to convey either London or Paris. The Company are hugely proud of everyone involved who helped to make this show a success. 🛨

As with all amateur societies, fundraising is a major headache. In previous years we had performed a cabaret in September combining all types of music. This helped to fund our major show in April, but the committee felt that we should try something different - but what? At our monthly committee meeting the fundraiser was on the agenda along with the usual society business. In the midst of this a voice said "you know we should do a show about this". This struck a chord with everyone. Add to that a conversation I had had recently with Ronnie Honey with both of us saying we would love to write a show about amateur musical life – and from these humble beginnings Am-Dram Antics! was born.

Amy Sutherland, Ronnie and I volunteered to take on the writing of what we were calling the revue. Lorna Wallace became costume mistress and Hazel Brooks and Elizabeth Donald took on the publicity and advertising of the show. Lots of ideas were flying about that night and the "mood board" soon was filled with everyone's ideas of how it should run. At the end of the evening we had the bones of the plot – why stop at the committee meeting – let's show what really happens behind the smiling faces on the stage on opening night! As the weeks passed the three of us worked well together and our

script got fruitier and funnier including a lothario with several 'ex's in the company, a diva, an illicit affair and the usual crushes on the leading man as well as various stroppy committee members (is this ringing bells out there?) and of course a director, a musical director and a choreographer with the usual problems!. When we read the script back to ourselves each time we dissolved into laughter -

Derek is a hugely talented man and he loved our idea and threw himself into Am-Dram - even doing the auditions and casting because we as writers wanted to be on stage too!! As an excellent choreographer, our only plea to Clare was – "don't make the dancing hard!!" On audition night we sat in a circle and everyone read for the part they wanted to be considered for as well as singing a song for Derek unaccompanied – another first for Falkirk Operatic Society - all done and dusted and the casting finished in one night.

As well as writing the show Amy, Ronnie and I got parts – Amy and Ronnie playing two of the leads and myself playing the secretary (a wee change). We also divided up the scenes among us and each directed two. We had meetings with Derek to finalise the song list, Clare to go over how many high kicks we could fit into each number and with each other to update on how the rehearsals were going with regard

to scenery, dialogue changes etc. The cast took everything in their stride and very quickly the show came together we finally made it to Falkirk Town Hall for dress rehearsal night and I have to admit to feeling sick at the thought of what we were about to do.

Opening night – I can't describe the feeling before hand - excitement, terror, I could go on. During the opening committee scene all we could hear was laughter and it never stopped the whole way through the show (except for the sad scenes). Then came the final number and we stood on the stage as the audience applauded and cheered. I hope I speak for Amy and Ronnie when I say I have never had a feeling like it we did it: wrote, produced, directed and performed our own show.

What started as a cost saving fundraiser turned into one of the biggest achievements of my life and definitely one ticked off the bucket list. My personal thanks go to my co-writers, Amy Sutherland and Ronnie Honey, our committee, but most of all the cast of Am-Dram Antics! - my Falkirk Opera Family. 

The Opera House, in Kidderminster, which was empty at the time, was acquired. Authentic costumes, originally used by the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company were hired at a cost of 20 guineas. The scenery was built by members of the society under the direction of Mr Bostock whose brother later became a President of the Society. An Orchestra was put together under the baton of Mr E.J.Pountney, a local cinema and
