NODA, the future as a CIO (Charitable Incorporated Organisation)

NODA is an unincorporated charity and as such the trustees take on personal liability for all its actions, it does not have a separate legal identity which means that it cannot as an organisation enter into contracts, own assets or take on liabilities, all these are currently taken on by the trustees on behalf of NODA.

Incorporation as a CIO (Charitable Incorporated Organisation) will give NODA a legal existence in its own right, it will be able to enter into contracts, own assets and take on liabilities. The CIO will still be

owned by and be responsible to its members in a manner very similar to those currently existing.

The trustees have been considering making an application to the Charity Commission to incorporate NODA as a CIO and a presentation was made during the recent AGM didyou**noda?** where those present gave overwhelming support to form such an organisation. Look out for our fun

Memory Lane (The Gala Edition)

We asked delegates to recount their first memories of treading the boards or their funniest moments. Since Michael Hastilow told of his first experience in Ruddigore as a Bridesmaid, it seems fair that we share similar tales from NODA friends from other Regions.

Dee from NODA South West was in a school performance back in 1965 when, aged 17, she played an elderly Queen.

David from NODA East Midlands told of his time aged 14, when he was dressed as a fox. The costume was irritating and uncomfortable between his fingers. It left an impression as to this day he always checks the wrists and fingers of his costumes.

Bob of NODA London South East, recalls auditioning for Tom of Warwick in Camelot; he was told he was too tall and joined the ensemble. He has never forgotten the magical feeling of performing and the camaraderie that performing offers.

I could not agree more, nearly all the people I spoke to, spoke with wonderment and elements of euphoria glowing in their voices and eyes as the recounted the buzz they got from being on stage.

Linda from NODA North explains a couple of her funniest memories. Some of which we can all find moments of solace in. She told us that back in the day, you were able to nip to the pub between scenes. She recalls setting the stage during a black out in one play for a scene best described as "a room in storage". The member of crew helping forgot which scene he was setting and as fast as she was putting dust sheets on furniture, he was removing them, resulting in a tug of war. Needless to say the tabs rose on a room looking less like a room in storage and more like it had been burgled.

We conclude our memories with Christine from NODA North West, who while in a school production, playing Lady Macbeth, wore a nightdress that was far too long. She entered, tripped, and fell down the

steps landing on her posterior. The boy playing Macbeth was pushed on by the teacher but could not stop laughing as Christine tried to get up. The Curtain fell and they had to re-do the scene all over again this time without the fall.

These are brilliant memories and as funny and spontaneous as they all were, they remind us of the changes to how we work. We may think some of the modifications are for the worst but in reality they are for the better and an apt reminder of the importance of NODAsafe.

Accidents happen, things on wheels roll, we fall and items get knocked over. If we want to continue to look back and enjoy blooper moments as fond memories, spare a thought and take a look at your health and safety policies. We love what we do, let's make sure the show goes on safely for all.



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
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In memorium

The Castle, Wellingborough; Update

Readers will know that, The Castle, Wellingborough's theatre, was put into administration during the summer. Things moved so quickly that by the time my article appeared the theatre was on its way to

reopening!



The Wellingborough council were true to their word and called a meeting of interested parties to see if the theatre had a future and this convinced them that indeed it did.

A specialist theatrical management consultant has been appointed and is now working with a skeleton staff to bring the theatre back to life. It is heartening that she is working with a representative of local people who is also organising a new 'Friends' group - something which was inexplicably abandoned by the old management of the theatre. A basic programme is being worked out which includes Wellingborough's 50th annual pantomime. And throughout its crisis the theatre doors were kept open by a local firm running the bar and

Sadly, it is still unlikely that local societies will get the money owed them for pre-administration shows but the good news is that the council are taking steps to ensure that this will not happen in future.


The show, performed at the end of October at the town's Corby Core theatre, involved many local performers, not least NODA's own Corby Amateur Theatrical Society.

Richard Laight, Boston **Operatic Society**

It is with great sadness and heavy hearts that we report the death of Richard Laight on 2nd September 2016.

Richard was on the board of Blackfriars Theatre, Boston, taking responsibility for Health and Safety in the theatre in the past few years. His knowledge of Blackfriars was extensive – he first performed in Blackfriars as a child, and had been an active member of BOS Musical Theatre Group for twenty years, taking both principal and chorus parts. He directed and produced several successful shows with them, including Annie, Oliver and Miracle on 34th Street. His production of "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way..." was nominated for a NODA Award. He also trod the boards with Playgoers, and was in

the occasional "Blackfriars" production such as Corpus Castle. He made a very good Dame in Panto. In addition he was a skilled setbuilder, had extensive knowledge of sound and lighting, and was an efficient Stage Manager



and backstage hand. In other words he had a passion for all aspects of theatre.

In his last year he decided to raise funds for two charities close to his heart, the MacMillan Fund and Blackfriars Trust. In this, as in most things that he did, his enthusiasm and drive led to great success, and he raised several thousand pounds for each cause with his calendars, his golf, his concert and just simply rattling his can in people's faces – all of this while suffering a terminal illness. He was philosophical about dying, though not without regrets, and I am sure he would want me to say to every youngster who reads this – please don't smoke.

There was one thing he loved more than the theatre, and that was his family. His beloved Lindy, and his harem of daughters were his pride and his joy, and the satisfaction he had in seeing his girls settle down with good husbands and starting families of their own meant everything to him. Our love and sympathy go to them.

Richard was still a relatively young man who still had a lot to give, and BOS MTG and Blackfriars Theatre and Arts Centre has lost a great friend.

has always been musical comedy and pantomime, though she has also performed in plays when suitable roles for 'women of a certain age' have presented themselves. For Riverside Players she has also directed musicals, plays and pantomimes and been active in all other back room jobs, Stage Manager, Box Office and FOH to name but a few, as well as Chair for five years.

Susan has performed in many musicals with local groups, though these days mainly supporting in off-stage activities.



Also a child of the 60's, Terry's interest in the theatre could be said to go back as far as Sunday School, when he was asked to find an interesting way of telling the story of The Good Samaritan. The following week he turned up with a model box of a theatre, along with working house tabs, battery operated Lego lights, a script and several scene changes! He was about 8 years old! Since then, he's moved on to real theatres!

Starting out with various youth theatre and dance groups, on leaving school he continued to keep up his performing interests with amateur groups, but worked backstage in professional theatre for about seven years. He says "I feel very fortunate to have had the opportunity to learn from some fabulous 'old school' professionals, covering lighting, sound, stage management, set design and scenic art, TIE (Theatre in Education) and even worked periodically in TV/film, but I have found my niche as a scenic artist."

Following a change in career, in 1997 he joined BACCES (British Airways Cabin Crew Entertainment Society) and returned to amateur theatre. Over the past 20 years he has been heavily involved with the staging of most BACCES productions, having written 10 scripts, designed and painted scenery, liaised with lighting sound designers and the musical director, and been Assistant Director.

Every year since I've been councillor I've seen an increasing number of pantos year on year – last season's tally was 17 pantos. As I always say I love all forms of theatre but I'll be the first to admit, even from a young child, I've never been particularly demonstrative when it comes to shouting out responses to such classics as "He's behind you..." Therefore, it came as a shock to many when I nominated as one of my winners in district 8 the Pantomime Aladdin and the Pirates by North Ormesby Minstrels

in the Middlesbrough area. The pantomime was a wonderful example of the art of engaging the audience of all ages and the society added its own quirkiness to the production with many modern twists. Of course I was "picked" upon – ending up on stage to be mercilessly ridiculed in their community singing by a brilliant female dame, Jill Stephenson. I'm hiding this year Jill – you won't get me...

Talking of awards, NODA North had its 4th year of Youth and Performance awards at the Rainton Meadows Arena in front of 600 enthusiasts from many societies from Berwick on the borders to Northallerton in North Yorkshire. Presenting the awards this year was Phil Barnett, Youth Councillor from Cornwall who made the near 1000 miles round trip to be with us. We hope the trip was worth it for him because it certainly was with us as nominees and society members "lapped up" Phil's infectious enthusiasm for our hobby.

Awards were presented by each regional rep both in adult class and youth categories as well as myself presenting similar awards as part of my councillor visits. Once again the range of ages of winners was diverse with the youngest being about 7 and the oldest into their 70's – the one thing that was constant was the pride displayed upon receiving their accolade by the reps or myself.

My own awards were a very difficult choice such was the standard displayed over the year with Middlesbrough Youth Theatre's Footloose winning the youth production; a very worthy winner in Lucy Conroy as my individual youth performer in her portrayal of "Susan" in Miracle on 34th Street; Eileen Glenton as my adult individual for her wonderful portrayal of "Norma Desmond" in Durham MTC's Sunset Boulevard; and finally Jarrow MTC - worthy winners for their magnificent production of Whistle Down the Wind.

A new award was presented this year – the Joyce Lonsdale award, named after a lady who was a truly unsung hero of amateur theatre as a society accompanist for many societies up until shortly before her death at the age of 90. The recipient of the inaugural award was a committee

nomination for David Brennan of Stagedoor Photography who has helped photograph many, many societies publicity shots over several years, helping promote them on social media – all for the love of the hobby.

There are many things to be learnt from the awards evening – as we do every year but the event will continue in the NODA North "calendar".

Good luck to all societies in the NODA North family – keep inviting your reps and/or myself to visit your productions and I hope that you've had a successful 2016 and are looking forward to a memorable 2017.



I am only now beginning to come down from being enveloped in the wonder and magic that is always the NODA Theatre Summer School. I can safely announce to the world that this is the only place and time in the year when I am truly and completely myself. The real reality. The rest is just counting the days till next year. Fortunately, there are over 200 of us at Summer School who feel exactly the same"

The best week of any year. The only one where you are free to be truly you, where warmth, affection and encouragement reign supreme, where all judgment is absent, where effort and courage are valued as highly as talent."

NODA Summer School is a week of extremes - extreme quality, extreme dedication, extreme partying. It's a chance to fully indulge in what is, for most of us, a hobby... Amateur Theatre! Whether your interest is singing, acting or dancing on stage, or whether you prefer the nonperformance elements of directing, make up, costumes, lighting or sound, there is something for everyone, and no one will leave having learned nothing, but adding to the repertoire of knowledge and skills that help raise the standards of the genre.

A dedicated team at The Office spend a year putting together a varied programme of courses from which to choose, hiring in professionals from the industry to tutor them who are generous in the sharing of their own personal wisdom and entertaining anecdotes. An open bar each night offers the chance to share with friends on other courses, play games, or practise "homework" you might even win some money with Phil's Heads and Tails! This may be the time when you see something from another course that makes you think, "I'd love to try that next year!" That is the moment you realise you're totally hooked! – Welcome to NODA Summer School - I'll see you there!"

But it's also for those older theatre lovers with open hearts and the wisdom to know that we never stop learning.

Before we broke for lunch we sang a medley of songs by Rogers and Hammerstein under the masterful tutorship of Andrew Nicol, and after a satisfying lunch, split into groups each visiting a difference selection of courses. There were plenty of chances to speak and mix with the students, many there for the second or third time... some for the 13th time. Those there for their first year were already making plans for the next year.

If you have the opportunity to attend Summer School it will be an experience that will stay with you for a very long time and give you a real opportunity to experience "The Bubble"."

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

What a great day! 🛨

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
Two Rotherham Lads reach for the Stars

Two lads from Rotherham are mixing with the stars this year after training in musical theatre. Both Luke Harley and Jonny Stewart are former members of Rotherham Teacher's Student Academy (RTSA), a youth group formed by Rotherham Teachers Operatic Society, now re-named Rotherham Musical Theatre Company.

Luke Harley first got into musical theatre at the age of 7 when he joined RTSA. From there Luke began to learn the process of putting a show together, rehearsals and what it actually entails to be in a show. As he grew older he began taking leading roles in a number of shows with some of the most memorable being Joe in Our House, Chris in Miss Saigon and Javert in Les Miserables. Luke also played Edna Turnblad in Hairspray when RTSA performed in the cabaret for the NODA North East Gala Weekend.

Luke decided to take things further and trained at the prestigious Cathedral Academy of Performing Arts (CAPA) in Wakefield where he gained valuable experience in his chosen career which also gave him a chance to realise how much hard work is needed to stay at the top of his game. It was whilst at CAPA that Luke auditioned for, and





was accepted at, the Festival4Stars in Glasgow. There he won a place at a celebrity workshop in London.

Luke then auditioned for ArtsEd, GSA and Mountview drama schools in London and was lucky enough to be accepted by all three. He chose, with the massive support of his parents, to go to ArtsEd, and, in his words, "had an incredible three years". It was here that Luke trained intensively to become the best he possibly could.

After leaving ArtsEd, Luke signed with an agent and began auditioning for shows, one of which was *Thoroughly Modern Millie* at Kenilworth House Theatre. Luke was in the ensemble and the show, directed by Stephen Mear, ran for four weeks in August and September this year.

Jonny Stewart joined Rotherham
Teacher's Student Academy (RTSA)
in 2008 where he made friends for
life. He immediately fell in love with
musical theatre and especially with Les
Miserables which was his first show for
the Academy. Having to leave RTSA
at the ripe old age of 20, after many
happy years, he then joined the "adult"
group, now named Rotherham Musical
Theatre Company, and performed in
many shows for the society, Crazy for

You, Annie Get Your Gun and Footloose to name a few.

Jonny had completed a 2 year BTEC Diploma in Musical Theatre at Rotherham College of Art and Technology and it was at this time that he started auditioning for London Drama Schools. However, unfortunately, he was not accepted at any of his chosen colleges in his first round of auditions so decided to save money by working full time and trying again in 2013.

In his second round of auditions he successfully gained a place at Mountview Academy of Theatre Arts in North London, moving to London to start his three year BA (Hons) course in Musical Theatre. Jonny says that, because of his time at Mountview, he has gone from strength to strength and made more friends for life as well as having the time of his life. He says that all the hard work, early mornings and late nights have certainly paid off for him as he gained his degree in Performing Arts.

Once he had graduated Jonny started auditioning for shows, one of which was Mamma Mia. His audition was a quick turnaround as the role had already been filled. However the performer who had been selected for the part suffered a bad knee injury which needed surgery meaning that the job became available again. Jonny says his agent sent the scripts, sheet music and information to him, he auditioned three days later and was told the same afternoon that he had got the job.

He started rehearsals in May and opened in the ensemble plus first cover for Sky at The Novello Theatre in June. His current run will last through until June 2017

Easter Egg – Seventy Years Young

At the end of World War II Dalziel High School Motherwell purchased Cleland Estate, now Dalziel Park, as a living memorial to pupils and staff who had lost their lives during the war. A War Memorial Trust was set up to run the estate and oversee its development. The Easter Egg Club was set up in 1947 as part of Dalziel High School Former Pupils' Association, along with the rugby and hockey clubs, and became part of the War Memorial Trust.

From the early shows in Motherwell Town Hall to the current productions in Motherwell Theatre the productions have been variety shows of song, dance & comedy – with something to suit the whole family. Only twice in its history, in the early 1970s, has the Club performed musicals – Orpheus in the Underworld and Oliver! In 1976 the club took part in Marasong which at the time was a world record 96 hours of continuous entertainment. The event was staged in Motherwell Concert Hall and raising over £2,500 for the upkeep of the estate.

Every show is unique and takes 12 months of planning and hard work by the whole Club to arrive at the finished product. This includes selecting the music, teaching the arrangements, creating and teaching the movement, building scenery and selecting costumes. As well as continuing to support the upkeep of Dalziel Park, as a living war memorial, the Club also raises money each year for a nominated local charity.

In 2017 the Club will celebrate 70 years since it was formed and it is already hard at work putting together its next production – Celebrate Good Times.

The show features a wonderful selection of music from a variety of well known artists including The Jersey Boys, One Direction, Queen, Adele and Michael Jackson as well as songs from well know musicals such as Mamma Mia! and Les Misérables. As always there will be a stunning set, fabulous costumes as well as a few laughs and a quest spot by pupils from Dalziel High School. The show is guaranteed, as always, to be a great night out for all the family.

As well as its ongoing contribution to the upkeep of Dalziel Park, the Club will be holding a bucket collection after each performance to provide support to Guide Dogs for the Blind. As well as the familiar guide dogs the charity also provides a guiding service which aims to support blind and partially sighted people to get out and about and do the things they want to do. In addition to this they also provide companion dogs and a variety of services aimed at children and young people.

Cats with the cream – more success for Minerva Youth!



Minerva Youth Theatre (MYT) was established in 1970 to give young people from the ages of 9 to 19 the opportunity to perform in full-scale musical theatre productions. Its first musical, The Wizard of Oz, took place in Partick Burgh Halls in Glasgow in 1971. The club has developed from performing what would be regarded as traditional school shows to productions that provide exciting and challenging experiences for all who take

part from the youngest to the oldest. MYT makes every attempt to cast the principal roles within the 9 to 19 age group. This means that the young people undertake challenging roles which would normally be played by adults. In the past ten years the club has grown so much that it now has around 60 to 70 boys and airls taking part in each show. Recent productions have included Fame, Les Misérables (School Edition), Joseph and the Amazing

Technicolor Dreamcoat, Back to the 80s and Honk! It is the current holder of the NODA Scotland Utopia Costumes Youth Award, which they received following their highly acclaimed 2015 production of Les Misérables (School Edition).

MYT is currently rehearsing for what it believes to be its most challenging show ever – Andrew Lloyd Webber's Cats based on Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats by T S Eliot. Susan B Russell, Artistic Director, said, "The cast and the production team are so excited about this year's show and the enthusiasm of the talent on stage is a joy to see." Cats will be performed in Eastwood Park Theatre, Giffnock, Glasgow, from Tuesday 7 to Saturday 11 February 2017.

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Harrogate or Bust

Mad Margaret's Minstrels from Bexhill were invited to take their production of "Harrogate or Bust" (previously Buxton or Bust) to the G & S Festival at Harrogate on Sunday 7 August, in the

All costumes and props were transported by van from Bexhill to Harrogate, with the cast together with some supporters, travelling by coach.

Following the performance, comments on Facebook by members of "Gilbert & Sullivan Society of Facebook" read "This afternoon at the International Gilbert & Sullivan Festival I saw a production called "Harrogate or Bust". This was a story about a G&S group trying to get ...to perform at Harrogate and their problems with their current show. It was extremely well thought out, well performed, a perfect sized orchestra and a high level of detail with sets, costumes, props etc. There was a very well deserved standing ovation at the curtain. Bravo Mad Margaret's Minstrels from Bexhill."

Stephen Turnbull, an Adjudicator commented: "Back from Harrogate or Bust in the Savoy

Theatre. I was expecting Mad Margaret's Minstrels to be a group of a dozen or so people, but they were a full company with their own (very good) 7-piece band. Their show called for a lot of props and stage furniture, and a good many costume changes, and it is full length – not down until 5pm. It was very much a show for the Inner Brotherhood – apart from making use of a vast number of G&S numbers, a lot of the characters' dialogue was recycled from the libretti, even though the piece is set in the present day. In their handout they talked of a "feel good factor" and that's true. There was a good house and they loved it. An ideal piece for a society to do as its second show in the half-year when it isn't working on the main show.'

Margaret Amey, strongly supported by her husband Neal, wrote the whole show and were runners up in the SE Region Awards for the Best G & S Production and presented with their certificate at the Awards Day on 10th July.

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
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CLOGS wins trophy at first attempt!
