It was with deep sadness that we learned of the passing of Past President Jack Underwood on Tuesday 3rd October 2017. Jack would have been 92 in December but the onset of dementia and a sudden deterioration of his health meant his final days were spent in Ninewells hospital where he died in the early morning of that Tuesday.

Following early employment with the Scottish Provident Assurance and then with Dundee City Police, Jack's musical talents were released when he joined Broughty Ferry AOS in 1947. It was here that he met his wife to be, Jenny, who was playing the leading role in *Princess Ida*. His clear bass voice would eventually be heard over the years with BFAOS, his church choir and then with the concert party The Ferryatrics once his on-stage days were over.

Jack was first elected as Regional Representative in 1970, serving until 1984 before being elected to Councillor in the September of that year. At the National Conference in Peebles Hydro in 1992 he was installed as President of the Association.

Jack was a popular President and he continued to serve on Council as an elected Life Member until 1998. He continued to support NODA and in particular the Scottish region, by visiting many shows with his wife Jenny who was his constant support until her passing in 2006.

We send our condolences to his son Bruce and daughter Christine and their families at this sad time.

Brian 'Tommy' Thomas: A Musical Celebration

Festival Players past and present gathered at Ashburton Hall, St Faith's School, Cambridge, on Saturday 30th September to celebrate the contribution

of Brian 'Tommy' Thomas, as he steps down as the society's musical director, after more than 40 years.

From The Arcadians (1973) to Legally Blonde (2016), Tommy has been the musical driving force behind no fewer than 54 productions for Festival Players (and more than 120 productions for Cambridge-based societies as a whole).

The celebration event featured Festival Players from many of those shows, performing a hand-picked selection of Tommy's favourite numbers, as well as a specially-choreographed interpretation of Harlequinade, an orchestral suite written by Tommy. Interspersed throughout were tributes, memories and anecdotes from friends old and

And of course, to keep energy levels high, there were the compulsory party dance routines every hour (anyone for the Macarena or Cha Cha Slide?)

The half-way point production meeting was accompanied by breakfast, and then it was back to rehearsals until the younger members re-joined after lunch. They didn't come back empty-handed though, instead bringing in countless baked goods ready for the Young NOMADS bake-off, which featured

A Tribute to Sir Peter Hall

The eminent director of plays, opera and films died on September 11th 2017 aged 86. Sir Peter was born and lived in Bury St Edmunds, Suffolk, where his father, Reg. worked for the railway. The family subsequently moved to Cambridge where Peter later attended the University, and started his theatre directing career.

Bury St Edmunds Amateur Operatic and Dramatic Society (BSEAODS) can claim a unique connection with this outstanding theatrical figure. His father, Reg. was a member in the mid-1920s and appeared in the Society's last production in the Theatre Royal (before closure by its owners, Greene King, when it became a barrel store, which was re-opened and restored 1965), and the first in The Playhouse in Buttermarket in the centre of town, then a cinema with a stage. His father also had a cameo role as the village policeman in Sir Peter's poetic film of Suffolk rural life, Akenfield, (1975). Sir Peter was also greatly involved with the latest restoration (2005/7) of our beautiful home, the Theatre Royal the only working Regency theatre (1819) in the UK – giving advice and as President of the Restoration Fund Appeal.

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oldIES' Tribute to an Old Friend

Jonathan Reynolds tells how NODA members past and present raised the roof to honour an old friend.

The Masque Theatre in Barton Seagrave, Northamptonshire, was the venue for a special compilation show performed on Sunday October 1st. A tribute to the stage career of Paul Aucott, who passed away earlier this year, 'oldIES' brought back together former members of IES. The IES group were one of Northamptonshire's leading musical theatre groups for many years until its sad demise 10 years ago.

Paul, a former NODA Representative, will always be remembered as an inspirational and innovative director who 'raised the bar' for amateur societies from the 1970s through to the early noughties. Many remember with great fondness his wonderful productions of Cabaret, West Side Story, The Hires Man, MAME and Jesus Christ Superstar to name but a few. On stage Paul was a consummate performer and will be long remembered in roles such as Professor Higgins in My Fair Lady, Judge Turpin in Sondheim's Sweeney Todd, Harry Chitterlow in Half a Sixpence and as Chief Tee Ah Millatoona in One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest.

> The 'oldIES' cast included 21 former IES members some of whom had not been on stage for over two decades but who rolled back the years and produced wonderful performances which wowed the full auditorium. Four of the cast were offspring of IES members giving the show an age range of 15-83!

The production team of Jonathan Reynolds (Producer), Barry Currall (Director), Daryl Handy (Choreographer) and Musical Director Kaye Tompkins had all worked with Paul on many occasions and were delighted to be putting the show together. The atmosphere during rehearsals was superb, and the fun and laughter left the younger members a little shell-shocked. Amongst the many glowing reviews was from the one from BBC Radio Northampton who described it as "A West End quality show at The Masque Theatre".

All profits from the 'oldIES' production will be donated to Prostate Cancer UK and, although the accounts are not yet complete, it is estimated that that the total raised will be in the region of £1,400. \bigstar

What's a Youth Production?

Under 16s, under 18s, under 21s? Amanda Hall, NODA East Midlands Youth Advisor, asks about how we define 'youth groups'.

Recently the NODA East Midlands Regional Committee has been discussing our youth organisations across the region.

Over the past few years I have been invited to many youth productions and have seen a wide variety of shows encompassing a huge age range and ability. But what age constitutes a youth production? We have seen some licensees putting upper age limits on many specific youth shows, but these vary from 14 years to 19 years and even older.

There is also now a huge selection of junior/youth and part/schools edition shows available, some of these are very for teenagers. Then there are the full shows like Fame which are aimed at the oldest of our youth/adult companies. There are also some major titles like Billy Elliott and now Mary Poppins that are only available to academic schools: a few schools in our region are NODA members and are therefore considered for awards with shows that are not generally available to other youth groups. If a youth company wants to do Oklahoma or My Fair Lady there are are growing strongly and often direct, design & produce the whole thing, but are they considered youth or adult?

For the purposes of our awards how do we compare such a variety of shows?



Alnwick Stage Musical Society Celebrates its 30th Anniversary Glorious Years!"

It all began over 30 years ago when local solicitor Norman Luke and civil servant Paul Toward decided that Alnwick should have a stage musical society and so, apparently, did those who turned up to an initial meeting at a local restaurant in Alnwick in the autumn of 1986. Out of that meeting, the society was formed and the first production - The Sound of Music saw the light of day in March 1987 and was a resounding success!

Since then the society has gone from strength to strength and has performed many popular musicals including, Oklahoma!, Me & My Girl, The Pirates of Penzance (Broadway version), Kiss Me Kate, HMS Pinafore, Fiddler on the Roof and Annie Get Your Gun. As well as the main show in March at Alnwick Playhouse, the society has occasionally put on a summer show consisting of concertstyle performances of excerpts from musicals, Musicals and Memories or smaller scale shows like Nunsense

which was performed in July 1999 and also, by popular demand, in 2000!

The Society celebrated its 30th anniversary this year with a sell-out production of Tim Rice and Andrew Lloyd Webber's Evita to be followed next year with a new production of that evergreen musical My Fair Lady.

An amazing evening of entertainment and celebration took place on September 9th to mark the 30 years, where honoured guests were Norman Luke and Paul Toward who founded the society. Teresa McQuillen who played 'Maria' and Margaret Reece were also present and they are the two surviving members who were in the very first production and still perform on stage today. Anthony Stoker also attended and holds the record for performing the most shows with the society.



Kirkcaldy Youth Music Theatre

In 1958 three people with a great interest in the local amateur theatre world of music and drama decided to launch a musical group aimed at the young people of Kirkcaldy and the surrounding community. Thus was born Kirkcaldy Teenage Opera Group, based in the YWCA in Kirkcaldy. The guiding principles of the group were (and still are): To offer an opportunity for any young person of secondary school age to participate in a musical production.

The name of the group subsequently changed to YWCA Light Opera Group and finally to Kirkcaldy Youth Music Theatre. The first production in 1959 was The Rajah of Rajapore (also known as The

I would also like to expand the work of the Youth Adviser to help attract and retain new and younger members of societies. 50 Years of Pantomime!



Glasgow Airport was opened in 1966 and the following year a group of employees got together with the idea of putting on an entertainment for local charities. Eric Goold in the Finance Department came up with a script for an airport pantomime called Ali Babbotsinch. (Glasgow Airport was originally called Abbotsinch). The show went on in the West School, Paisley, on 15 and 16 December 1967 – and Glasgow Airport Drama Club was born!

The Club built up a repertoire of seven main pantomimes (with book, music and lyrics by Eric Goold) which, with a bit of updating, we still rotate annually. With the pantomime at one time running for two weeks at a time, and in recent years cramming 9 full-length shows into one week, it is estimated that something in the region of 125,000 audience members have attended an Eric Goold panto.

There have been so many highlights over the years, including participation at the Glasgow Garden Festival 1988, an appearance on Cilla Black's Surprise, Surprise, and last year the broadcast of our panto on Scottish Television.

After 40 years we changed our name in 2007 to Runway Theatre Company which widened our appeal, while still preserving our links with the Airport, and enhancing the good reputation for traditional family pantomimes of which we are justly proud.

In 2010 the company diversified and now produces a spring musical each year with a policy of producing new or rarely performed works. Our first musical was Camelot, and other productions have included the Scottish Premières of The Drowsy Chaperone and Lend Me A Tenor -The Musical; the Scottish Amateur Première of Whistle Down the Wind, as well as our recent acclaimed productions of Evita and Priscilla, Queen of the Desert. 🛧

Davies's interest in the amateur stage began at Ayr Academy where he participated in several Gilbert & Sullivan operettas and designed and made the scenery for the Academy's production of Iolanthe. After

qualifying as a lawyer in 1959, he joined Ayrshire Philharmonic Opera Society and played several principal parts, also participating in the chorus. He was the Society's Hon Secretary for a number of years and became President in the Society's Golden Jubilee in 1984. He currently holds the position of the Society's Honorary President

In 1973 the Gaiety Theatre, Avr. in which the Philharmonic staged its shows, was threatened with closure and redevelopment and to prevent that happening Davies applied successfully in his own right to have the Theatre listed in the Register of Buildings of Historic and Architectural interest. As a result the Gaiety still stands today.

In 1982 Davies became Regional Representative for Avrshire, Renfrewshire and Bute, a position he has held since then. He has been privileged to attend many productions of District 4 societies over the years and has made many friends during that period. He thought it was time to retire from the role at the Scottish Region's Conference at Peebles in October. Following upon the untimely death in January 2017 of Scottish Regional Councillor, Gordon Blackburn, Davies filled in as Acting Councillor for the Scottish Region, a position he vacated in September upon the election of the new Councillor. Davies has also acted as Hon Legal Adviser to the Scotland Region on matters involving Scots Law. Davies is also an Honorary Member of NODA, a distinction conferred on him at the National AGM at Buxton a few years ago.

Davies met his wife Joan at the NODA Summer School held at Ripon in 1969 and they married the following year. They have two sons, Graeme and Kevin, and three grandchildren. 🛨

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Benches, a new play by Margaret Graham

> In May 2017 Ifield Barn Theatre Society brought to their stage another original script by member Margaret Graham. As

with her previous NODA South East award-winning plays - Miniskirts & Revelations and Flowery Shirts & Strange Relations – Benches provoked a lot of curiosity. It was performed to five packed houses and provoked many thoughtful responses. Benches – A Ghost Story was inspired by Hove seafront which is where the play is set.

The previous year, walking the esplanade, Margaret had wondered about the memorial benches. What if such a diverse range of mortals were seated on 'their' benches, observing the comings and goings of oblivious passers-by? What would these 'Benchers' say to each other? What would they have in common? Suppose they included some 1920s end-of-the-pier showgirls; a newlydeceased young biker; a 1950s Nan with a sensitive secret; a despised conscientious objector who met his fate in the Second World War?

Richard Townley, the conscientious objector, became the focal point of the play and is based on a semi-biographical script written by Margaret's father - Harold Goodwin - in 1941. It includes a tribunal scene which (as with his daughter's writing) is both comedic and poignant.

Richard's story, his conscientious objector philosophy and tribunal scene, could have been a contentious issue even though the intention was not conversion to his point of view. However, feedback showed positive reactions - it gave some younger people an insight into past generations' experiences, older people related to some of the characters and stories, and others said they found it 'thought provoking', especially in regard to current world happenings.

As NODA South East representative Lance Milton wrote in his report: 'The concept is wonderful, the whole company should be proud of a very engaging and entertaining production which I think Harold would have enjoyed watching as much as we, the audience did.'

A Phoenix in the Surrey Hills -**Polesden Lacey Shakespeare**

In 1951 the villagers of Bookham carved an open air theatre "for the people" out of the chalk hillside at the National Trust property, Polesden Lacey. Since then, there has been at least one performance of Shakespeare at the theatre every year.

Sixty years later, in 2009, the flame nearly died, when the National Trust decided to stop underwriting the performances. This was too



much for a small group of local enthusiasts who banded together to create Polesden Lacey Shakespeare Ltd, which rose, phoenix-like, from the ashes, albeit with substantial practical support from the National Trust.

Evening performances and expensive sets were abandoned, allowing ticket prices to be kept to a minimum with no charge for children under sixteen. Interestingly audience levels were maintained since parents, who might have otherwise stayed away, attended with their children.


The company now funds a group of professional actors who perform scenes from Shakespeare and abbreviated versions of Shakespeare's plays for children in local schools and around the grounds of Polesden Lacey.

The new phoenix is being kept alive by local people who have a passion for Shakespeare and want to keep the theatre, built by the people, for the people, alive and kicking.

Sadie Williams: Tunbridge Wells **Operatic & Dramatic Society**

Sadie joined Tunbridge Wells Operatic (TWODS) in 1947 performing in Katinka. She met her future husband Rex the following year in Tom Jones and they married in 1950. Sadie became Company Manager in 1998 and is still the 'public face' of TWODS, greeting audiences as a key part of the Front of House team. She is also President of LAMPS.

Earlier this year Sadie was presented with her 70 year award by the Chairman of TWODS, Kevin Denson and the two are pictured.

John Barnes, Chairman of NODA, has commented that Sadie never fails to invite him to TWODS productions and, in the interval to "Sadie's Corner" in the bar where she dispenses hospitality to VIPS attending. Sadie has an encyclopaedic knowledge of amateur theatre and always willing to share with all.

Curtain up on NODA's new website

Months in the making, with hours of work behind the scenes, NODA's brand new website launched at the end of September during the national AGM.

Here's a quick Q&A about some of the changes we've made.

Why did NODA need a new website?

An excellent question. The old site had been serving us for close to five years, it was getting very large and wasn't always very easy to use. Building a new site has given us the chance to review and improve the way things work. The new website uses the same address as the old one, so anyone can find us at **noda.org.uk**

So, what's changed?

The way our systems talk to each other. The new website integrates with our national database. This means that you can be in control of all your data, and can update your personal or society details at any time simply by logging into the website. In turn, this means our records will be more up to date and accurate, making it easier for us to talk to you. We've also been able to improve the experience of using the website – it's now much simpler to navigate and search to find the things you need.

Where is the members' area? This is one of the biggest changes we've made. There is no longer one specific area that only members can access. Instead, all the pages

that were previously tucked away in the members' area can be seen in the main menu, underneath 'Our Services'. If you hold the membership details for your society or you're an individual member and you are logged into the site you will be able to click on the pages and view the

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content. If you are not a member, or you are not logged in, when you click on the page you'll see a message explaining that this content is for members only.

But why?

The great thing about doing it this way is that everyone can see the kinds of services we offer in the main menu. It will help us to let people know who we are and what we do. And it makes everything easy to locate!

I still can't find what I'm looking for!

Don't worry! Just use the search box at the top of the menu. Simply type in a couple of keywords about the thing you're looking for and choose your page from the list of results.

Why does it look different on my mobile?

The new website is built to be responsive. This means that if you visit the site on a

mobile phone or a tablet the site recognises this and changes the way it looks to make your experience better. The mobile view forces the page to fit your phone or tablet screen so you don't need to keep scrolling across

to view the whole thing. It also makes the menus easier to select on a touchscreen

What about Summer School?

Summer School has its very own area on the new website. Simply click on the Summer School homepage in the menu and explore the tabs across the top of the page. You'll need to be signed into the website to book onto a course.

What else is new?

You can now easily share pages from the site, including show reports and news to your social media accounts. When you're using the website on a computer just click on the icon at the right hand edge of the page to quickly share to Facebook, Twitter or other sharing platforms.

1. Register with the site

Remember to save all your changes. To return to using the site as yourself, rather than your society,

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How to make a Cortina!

With no theatre in Crediton, (just some pretty ordinary school halls) CODS is challenged every year to stage its shows. The 'fit up' for their musicals usually takes about 10 days, though this does allow a blank canvas, based upon the vision of the director. The vision for this year's production of Made in Dagenham was 'in the round' and it needed a car ... a 1968 Cortina, as produced by the Dagenham Factory at the time of the strike.

This was quite challenge for the production team - these cars are collectors' items and probably start at around £3000 – guite outside the show budget! Fortunately one eagle-eyed member of the production team, traveling home from business in Cornwall, spotted a car well tucked-away almost out of sight from the road with a familiar shape. Was it a Cortina? It was, but not guite the model the Society hoped for and it was a rust bucket, with lots of parts missing. With some persuasion it was just about affordable though and was acquired.

Imaginative minds got to work. A real car was needed in the show for the song Cortina! covering the grand launch of the new Cortina, it also faced the scrutiny



of an audience in the round who would be pretty close to the action. With so much of the car too far aone, the best thing to do was to cut it in half ... length-ways! And after a considerable number of hours, skill, hard graft, oxy-acetylene, welding gear, filler, spray guns, primer, car paint, and go faster stripes, the group had their Cortina. It wasn't an MK2, but the dancing girls, clad in shiny gold dresses, were good enough to provide a distraction, as did the 12ft by 10ft video movie of really classy Lotus 1968 MK2, actually made in the Dagenham factory, that was filmed earlier.

So the illusion was complete, pulled together by a great deal of imagination, an eagle-eyed fixer, hours of skilled hard work, a bit of filming, and the magic of lights, costume and one great song and dance routine. All 4 minutes 41 seconds of it looked great, and my goodness it was worth it! Find out more at www.codsonline.com! 🛧

We, the New Kinver Players, were very honoured when the National Trust invited us to contribute to the Centenary Celebrations of their acquisition of Kinver Edge and the Rock Houses.

Kinver Edge, a heath and woodland escarpment, is home to a set of cave houses carved straight into the local sandstone rock face and

the last troglodyte dwellings occupied in England.

The first written account of inhabitants was back in 1777 and the last residents moved out in 1962. Their peak was in the early 1860s when there were 11 dwellings, housing 44 people.

There were no relevant 'ready-made' plays, so I volunteered; a daunting task as I'd never written a play before. We decided to stage it in one of the caves, which contributed greatly to its success. The atmosphere and acoustics were incredible, helping us to bring to life not only the characters, but the houses themselves. The intimate setting provided space for an audience of 50 per performance, and we were delighted to be sold-out for every one. Such was the success, we have been invited to do a repeat performance in spring 2018.

The history of the site is fascinating. I was determined to keep the play factual, and was fortunate to have access to interviews
